# Easterville

## Community Status

The community of Easterville developed beside the Chemawawin Indian Reserve. It is located on the south shore of Cedar Lake about 40 kilometres by air west of Grand Rapids.

The community and reserve relocated to this site in 1962-63 as a result of the flooding of Cedar Lake caused by construction of the hydro dam on the Saskatchewan River, where it enters Lake Winnipeg at Grand Rapids.

The area is a mixture of rock outcrops, small pockets of marsh and black spruce timber. Some parts of the timber can be selectively harvested.

Road access is provided by PR #327, which connects both PTH #6 and PTH #10. Both Grand Rapids and The Pas are about 100 km from Easterville.

Easterville is governed by a mayor and council under *The Northern Affairs Act*.

## Emergency Services

### Fire

Fire fighting capability is based on a pumper truck and equipment from the community fire hall. Additional portable forestry-style equipment is available for grass and brush fires.

### Police

Police response is from the Grand Rapids detachment, RCMP, phone (204) 329-2332.

### Medical

Medical response is limited to a federal nursing station on the reserve, staffed by three nurses, one community health worker and 2 on-call workers. The nearest hospital is at The Pas. Emergency medical transport service is provided by a medical van.

## Community-based Services

### Airstrip

An unattended limited maintenance 2,600' x 35' emergency gravel airstrip is located on the edge of the community. It is necessary to phone the nursing station in advance to arrange for use.

### Hydro

Provided by Manitoba Hydro as land-line electric power. Residential rates are:

### Telephone

Manitoba Telecom Services provides individual-line service and digital switching with toll-free calling to Grand Rapids. Call MTS toll-free at (204) 225-5687.

### Water

Water source is wells. Water is chlorinated and pumped to two pump houses and a standpipe. The community administration building, the nursing station and school facilities have running water supplied by the system. Water delivery is available to individual houses.

### Waste Disposal

The Community has a solid-waste disposal site located south of the community. It is used by the Chemawawin Cree Nation as well.

Sewage is delivered from holding tanks to the Chemawawin Cree Nation Lagoon.

All treaty and non-treaty students attend school on the Chemawawin Indian Reserve.
