He was an enthusiastic radio operator, and his cheery greetings and messages will be greatly missed throughout the north. In accordance with his wishes, he was buried at Igloolik. He is survived by his mother and two brothers in Scotland, a sister, Mrs. C.N. Stephen of Fort Vermilion, Alberta, and his son, Jacob Sandy, in Toronto".
