Joint Emergency Preparedness Program (JEPP)

- Established in 1980 to enhance national preparedness and response capability for all types of emergencies
- Funded at approximately \$5 million annually
- Provides funding on a cost-shared basis
- Federal share is reimbursement after projects are complete and claims submitted



JEPP Funding Criteria

- Projects must have:
- Clear objectives that support JEPP priorities
- Clear beginning and end
- Financial commitment to the project from the provincial/territorial or municipal governments
- Identification of how Government of Canada participation will receive visibility and recognition
- Provincial audits required for all projects with a federal share of \$50,000 or more



Typical JEPP Projects

- Municipal emergency plans & exercises
- Training
- Generators and switches
- Equipment for Emergency Operation Centres and Evacuation Shelters
- Telecommunications equipment



Non-Eligible Projects

- Equipment considered to be the routine responsibility of first responder agencies such as police, fire and ambulance
- Projects from the private sector
- Projects from federal departments or agencies



JEPP Funding

- The GoC contributes approximately \$5 million annually to JEPP with additional funding provided through Budget 2001
- More than \$152 million has been committed since 1980
- Projects are cost-shared between Federal and Provincial (Municipal) governments
- Cost-sharing ratio is negotiated on a case-by-case basis and depends on nature of project and funds available.
- A portion of the annual JEPP allocation (75%) is designated as “earmarked” funds and set aside for each province on a per capita basis to fund priority projects as determined by each jurisdiction.
- The remaining portion (25%) of the JEPP allocation is designated as “regular” funds for projects assessed on a comparative merit basis against evaluation criteria and established national priorities.



Other Initiatives Under JEPP

- The December 2001 Federal Budget identified additional funds to be administered through JEPP:
 - **\$10 million over two fiscal years (2001/02 & 2002/03) for the provision of Chemical, Biological, Radiological and Nuclear (CBRN) incident response equipment for First Responders**
 - **\$20 million over six fiscal years (2001/02-2007/08) to develop Canada's national Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) capacity with ongoing annual funding of \$3 million**
 - **\$400,000 annually for Critical Infrastructure Protection related initiatives**



JEPP Process

- **Community or communities consider projects and seek approval. EMO Emergency officers available to assist.**
- **Projects submitted to EMO NLT last week of November thru emergency officers.**
- **All JEPP proposals are considered by a joint Manitoba review committee (Director of Ops; all Emergency Officers; Public Safety and subject matter experts as needed) 1st week of December.**
- **EMO and Public Safety evaluate the proposals and establish a rank-ordered list and identify the proposals for Earmarked funds and those that will compete nationally for Regular funds. January.**
- **The regionally approved list is signed off by the RD and forwarded to Ottawa to the National JEPP review committee. 1 February**
- **The federal JEPP Committee recommends acceptance, rejection, or acceptance with amendments of all proposals to the Senior Assistant Deputy Minister (SADM). March**



JEPP Process (continued)

- **Public Safety Canada (nationally) maintains a prioritized list of proposals that could not be funded due to insufficient funds, and these can be recommended for acceptance if funds become available during the year.**
- **Approved projects communicated to municipalities to allow for purchasing to begin. April**
- **Project managers finalize the projects and submit receipts on JEPP Claim form through the EMO for RD review.(April till 31 March)**
- **Ottawa receives finalized claims and cuts a cheque to the province for the agreed cost share amount.**
- **Community arranges an opportunity for cheque presentation as available.**

Page Three

- A very specific statement that indicates the purpose of the project
- That the project has been ratified by council



Page Four

- Statement indicating that community has an approved emergency plan
- Date and any reference to exercising that plan



Page Five

Map Reference Point

- A map or GIS product that situates the community geographically within Manitoba.



Page Six

Summary of Equipment to be purchased

- A summary of items and the cost of each in a one page easy to read document.



Page Seven

Itemized Cost Estimate - Quote

- Original cost estimates/quotes by the people from whom you are purchasing your products.



Finalize Claim Process

- Please ensure that your claim matches the quote and any changes are advised to Public Safety **BEFORE** submitting the claim.
