
Economic Overview

Real Gross Domestic Product

- The Manitoba Bureau of Statistics estimates that Manitoba's real GDP grew 1.9% in 2016, above the national average of 1.5%.
- Manitoba's real GDP is expected to grow by 2.2% in 2017, fourth among provinces, Canada (2.6%) and by 1.9% in 2018, fifth among provinces, Canada (2.0%).
- Manitoba's Nominal GDP grew by 2.5% in 2016. Nominal GDP is expected to grow by 4.2% in 2017 and by 3.6% in 2018, fifth and tied for fifth among provinces respectively.

Consumer Price Index (May 2017)

- Manitoba's inflation rate is averaging 1.7%, fifth among provinces and the same as Canada.
- Food, clothing and footwear, household operations, health and personal care, and alcohol and tobacco eased pressure on prices while transportation, shelter, and recreation and education increased overall prices.

- In 2016, Manitoba's inflation rate averaged 1.3%, sixth among provinces and below Canada at 1.4%.
- In 2017, Manitoba crop producers seeded more oats 44.0%, soybeans 40.1%, and corn 18.8%, and less canola 1.1%, wheat 6.7% and barley 26.4%. Producers seeded 2.3 million acres of soybeans, the largest amount on record.
- Manitoba <u>urban area</u> housing starts increased 93.6% in the first six months of 2017, first among provinces. Canada up 7.9%. <u>All area</u> starts were up 77.7% in the first six months of 2017, first among provinces. Canada up 7.2%.
- Manitoba farm cash receipts are up 4.8% in the first quarter of 2017, first among provinces. Crop receipts increased 9.3%, livestock receipts were down 5.4% and direct payments increased 7.7%.
- Investment in non-residential building construction is up 27.1% in the first quarter of 2017, second among provinces, Canada down 0.6%.
- Investment in residential building construction is up 9.5% in the first quarter of 2017, third among province, Canada up 7.6%.

Labour Market

Employment (June 2017)

- Employment increased 1.0% or 6,500 jobs in the first six months of 2017, while the labour force gained 3,600 workers.
- Full-time employment increased 1.2% or 6,100 jobs and part-time employment increased 0.4% or 400 jobs.



 In 2016, Manitoba's employment decreased 0.4%, tied for fifth among provinces.
 Manitoba's labour force expanded 0.1% sixth among provinces.

Unemployment Rate (June 2017)

- Manitoba's unemployment rate is averaging 5.6%, second lowest among provinces and below the 6.6% national average.
- In 2016, Manitoba's unemployment rate was 6.1%, second lowest behind British Columbia. The youth unemployment rate was 13.2%, fifth among provinces.

Average Weekly Earnings (Apr. 2017)

- Average weekly earnings in Manitoba are up 2.6%, first among provinces and above Canada 1.5%.
- In 2016, average weekly earnings in Manitoba were up 0.9%, seventh among provinces and above the national increase of 0.4%.

Population

- As of April 1, 2017, Manitoba's population stood at 1,332,629, an increase of 20,851 persons or 1.6% from a year earlier.
- As of July 1, 2016, Manitoba's median age was 37.5 years, the third youngest among

provinces, and below the national level of 40.6 years.

Net Migration

- For the 12 months to March 31, 2017, Manitoba gained 14,014 persons through migration.
 - Net international in-migration was estimated at 14,751 and net interprovincial out-migration was estimated at 6,747.
- Natural increase was estimated at 6,837. (number of births less number of deaths)

Economic Activity

Retail Sales (April 2017)

- Manitoba's seasonally adjusted retail sales increased 3.0% in the first four months of 2017 ninth among provinces, compared to a 6.5% national increase.
- Sales rose on the strength of gasoline station sales 20.1%, electronics and appliance stores 6.7%, building materials 4.5% and health & personal care stores 3.9%.
- In 2016, Manitoba retail sales increased 4.2%, ranked sixth among provinces and below Canada up 5.1%.
- The number of new motor vehicles sold in Manitoba was up 7.7% in the first four months of 2017, third among provinces

(Canada up 2.4%). Sales of passenger vehicles declined 2.0%, while truck sales increased 10.9%.

 In 2016, new motor vehicle unit sales were down 1.0%, sixth among provinces, Canada up 2.3%.

Manufacturing Sales (April 2017)

- Manitoba's seasonally adjusted manufacturing sales increased 1.3% in the first four months of 2017, ninth among provinces. Canadian sales up 6.0%.
- Sales of electrical products, printing, wood products, chemicals, fabricated metals, transportation and food are leading growth while primary metals and machinery are lagging growth.

 In 2016, Manitoba's manufacturing sales increased 1.3% fifth among provinces. Canadian sales increased 1.0%.

Wholesale Trade (April 2017)

- Manitoba's seasonally adjusted wholesale sales increased 5.3% in the first four months of 2017, eighth among provinces, compared to a 8.4% national increase.
- Sales rose on the strength of machinery and equipment, food, personal and household goods and farm products - sales declined in

building supplies and motor vehicles and parts.

 In 2016, wholesale sales decreased 1.0% seventh among provinces, Canada up 3.1%.

Capital Investment

Building Permits (May 2017)

- The seasonally adjusted value of Manitoba's building permits increased 0.5% in the first five months of 2017, eighth nationally. Canada up 6.1%.
- Total non-residential permits decreased 32.7%. <u>Commercial</u>, <u>industrial</u> and <u>institutional</u> permits were down 23.6%, 44.9% and 46.7% respectively.
- Manitoba residential building permits increased 35.6%.
- Total building permits in Winnipeg increased 0.4% and outside of Winnipeg increased 0.7%.
- In 2016, the value of Manitoba building permits increased 13.5%, second nationally, Canada up 0.9%.

Non-Residential Building Structures (Q1, 2017)

• Investment in non-residential building construction is up 27.1% in the first quarter of 2017, second among provinces, Canada down 0.6%.



- In the first quarter of 2017, non-residential investment increased in <u>industrial</u> and <u>commercial</u> by 64.2% and 35.4% respectively and declined in institutional by 2.6%.
- In 2016, investment in non-residential building construction declined 6.3%, seventh among province, Canada down 1.2%.

Residential Structures (Q1, 2017)

- Investment in residential building construction is up 9.5% in the first quarter of 2017, third among province, Canada up 7.6%.
- In the first quarter of 2017, residential investment increased in <u>new construction</u> by 24.4% and declined in <u>renovations</u> by 10.0% while <u>acquisition costs</u> increased by 68.0%.
- In 2016, residential building investment decreased 2.6%, seventh among provinces, Canada up 3.6%.

CAPEX Survey (February 2017)

- Statistics Canada's Capital and Repair Expenditure Survey released February 2017, projected Manitoba's 2017 capital investment to decrease 4.2% to \$9.8 billion, eighth among provinces. Canada up 0.8%. Private investment is projected to increase 0.2% and public investment to decrease 0.9%.
- In 2016, Manitoba's capital investment increased 7.6% to \$10.2 billion, the third highest growth nationally, Canada down 5.0%.
- Private investment decreased 0.8% and public capital investment increased 2.5%.

Housing Starts (June 2017)

 Manitoba <u>urban area</u> housing starts increased 93.6% in the first six months of 2017, first among provinces. Canada

- up 7.9%. Single starts were up 52.3% and multiples starts were up 133.6%.
- Province-wide housing starts increased 77.7% in the second quarter of 2017, highest among provinces and above Canada (7.2%).

- In 2016, there were 4,436 urban area starts, a 9.7% decline, but still the seventh highest level since 1987. Single starts were up 10.6% (2,069 units). Multiples were down 22.2% (2,367 units), sixth highest level since 1987. In 2016, 83.4% of all starts in the province were in urban areas and 44.5% of these were multiple starts.
- In 2016, province-wide housing starts continued to slow following record-setting levels in 2013. Last year, province-wide housing starts decreased 3.3%, (5,318) sixth among provinces. Multiple starts decreased 17.7% (2,614), while single starts were up 16.3% (2,704). Multiple starts now represent 49.2% of total starts, down from 57.7% in 2015.

Foreign Merchandise Exports (May. 2017)

Manitoba exports increased 1.4%, in the first five months of 2017, eighth among provinces, while Canadian exports increased 12.3%.

- Manitoba's U.S. exports decreased 7.5% in the first five months of 2017 and non-U.S. exports increased 20.8%.
- In 2016, Manitoba's exports decreased 1.7%, fourth nationally, while Canadian exports were down 2.6%. Manitoba's exports to the U.S. were down 3.7% and non-U.S. exports increased 2.7%.

Agriculture

Farm Cash Receipts (First Quarter 2017)

• Manitoba farm cash receipts are up 4.8% in the first quarter of 2017, first among provinces. Crop receipts increased 9.3% with increases in soybeans 39.6%, corn 28.7%, and canola 11.6% and declines in barley 27.9%, wheat 9.8% and oats 6.8%.

- Livestock receipts were down 5.4% with cattle and calves down 25.1% and hogs down 0.5%.
- Direct payments, which include insurance and other income supports programs, increased 7.7%.
- In 2016, cash receipts increased 2.0% to \$5.9 billion, just under the record \$6.0 billion in 2014. Crops, livestock and direct payments generated \$3.6 billion, \$2.1 billion and \$0.2 billion in receipts, respectively.

Seeded Area (June 2017)

In 2017, Manitoba crop producers seeded more oats 44.0%, soybeans 40.1%, and corn 18.8%, and less canola 1.1%, wheat 6.7%, rye 20.0%, barley 26.4%, sunflower 28.6% and flaxseed 35.3%. In 2017, producers seeded 2.3 million acres of soybeans, the largest on record and planted 3.1 million acres of canola and 2.7 million acres of wheat.

Mining and Petroleum

Metallic Mining (April 2017)

• In the first four months of 2017, the quantity of Manitoba's zinc production increased 23.6%, while copper, nickel and gold production declined 9.2%, 6.9% and 5.4% respectively.

In 2016, Manitoba's nickel production increased 0.3%, copper advanced 5.9% and zinc production increased 17.0% while gold production declined 4.9%.

Commodity Prices (June 2017)

- After a sharp drop in base metal prices in 2014 and 2015, overall prices have been stable and gradually improved in the second half of 2016.
- The price of copper is up by 18.1% in June compared to the average in 2016. The price for nickel is up 2.1% in June. As zinc inventories decline, prices have increased, up by 28.4% in June. After improving by 7.6% in 2016, the price of gold is down 0.9% in June compared to the average in 2016.
