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MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE

On behalf of The Municipal Board, we are pleased to present the 2021 Annual Report for the year ending December 31, 2021.

The Municipal Board is established under and operates in accordance with *The Municipal Board Act*. Section 106(1) of the *Act* requires the Board, on or before March 1 in each year, to transmit to the Minister a report for the year ending December 31 of the previous year.

The Board's duties and responsibilities are assigned to it under 17 Acts of the Legislature. For your ease of reference, a consolidated summary of the Board's 2021 activities is located on page 8. The majority of the Board's activities relate to Assessment Appeals under *The Municipal Assessment Act*, the bulk of which are assessments of properties in The City of Winnipeg.

The Board undertook its biggest challenge and transformation in 2018, addressing the backlog of assessment appeals through an Appeal Management process which includes Case Management mediation conferences. The Board continued to deal with all backlogged appeals in 2021 and is on schedule to remove the backlog by the next assessment cycle in 2023. Authorities and agents alike continue to provide positive feedback on this monumental shift in processes.

On October 29, 2021, amendments to *The Planning Act* and *City of Winnipeg Charter* were proclaimed expanding the Board's mandate with new planning appeals. In anticipation of these amendments, the Board conducted an internal review of its planning appeal protocols to see where improvements could be made. The Board looks forward to the implementation of new planning rules and procedures, which will help streamline all planning matters before the Board, to ensure continued efficiency and success in its service delivery.

As a result of the Covid-19 pandemic, the Board was forced to pivot several times in order to comply with public health orders. The Board conducted a number of matters through tele-conferencing and virtual platforms. Though not without challenges, the Board carried out its rigorous workload while achieving increased productivity.

In 2021 the Board saw a significant increase in Borrowing By-laws under *The Municipal Act*. Most of these borrowings were handled administratively, while only a small number required a hearing. In addition, when allowable, the Board sat on various planning related hearings that took place in different Municipalities within the Province.

The complement of the Board as of December 31, 2021 is 15, which includes the Chair and Vice Chair. Our Board Members have consistently attended the Manitoba Council of Administrative Tribunals Annual Conference and Board Member seminars, as well as participated in the Board's in-house orientation and training. Due to Covid-19, conferences and seminars were conducted virtually.

As a quasi-judicial tribunal, the Board is governed by the laws of natural justice that require, among other things, the fair and equal treatment of all parties. The Board ensures that it provides service to municipalities and the public at-large in a fair, transparent and professional manner through consistent review of, and updates to, its policies and procedures, its commitment to providing all documents in both official languages, keeping its website up-to-date, and responding to all public enquiries in a timely and comprehensive manner. Board executives regularly meet with Board Members to discuss legal and administrative updates, share hearing experiences and to address other pertinent matters.

In closing, we wish to thank Board Members, staff, government departments, municipalities and the members of the public for supporting the Board's journey of continuous improvement.

MESSAGE DE L'ÉQUIPE DE DIRECTION

Au nom de la Commission municipale, nous avons l'honneur de vous présenter le rapport annuel 2021 pour l'exercice se terminant le 31 décembre 2021.

La Commission municipale est établie et exerce ses activités en vertu de la Loi sur la Commission municipale. Le paragraphe 106(1) de la Loi exige que la Commission transmette au plus tard le 1^{er} mars de chaque année au ministre responsable un rapport sur l'exercice terminé le 31 décembre de l'année précédente.

Les fonctions et responsabilités de la Commission lui sont conférées par 17 lois adoptées par l'Assemblée législative. À des fins de référence, vous trouverez en page 8 de ce rapport un sommaire consolidé des activités entreprises par la Commission en 2021. La majeure partie des activités de la Commission sont liées à des appels de la valeur déterminée de biens imposables déposés en vertu de la Loi sur l'évaluation municipale. La majorité de ces appels concerne des propriétés situées dans la Ville de Winnipeg.

En 2018, la Commission a amorcé une transformation qui constituait un défi majeur en s'attaquant aux retards touchant les appels de la valeur déterminée de biens imposables, dans le cadre d'un processus de gestion des appels comprenant des conférences de médiation de la gestion des cas. En 2021, la Commission a continué de s'occuper des appels en retard et est en voie d'éliminer l'arriéré d'ici le prochain cycle d'évaluation en 2023. Les autorités et les agents continuent de fournir des commentaires positifs sur ce changement monumental des processus.

Le 29 octobre 2021, l'entrée en vigueur de modifications à la Loi sur l'aménagement du territoire et à la Charte de la ville de Winnipeg a permis d'élargir le mandat de la Commission à de nouveaux appels en matière d'aménagement. En prévision de ces modifications, la Commission a procédé à un examen interne de ses protocoles d'appel en matière d'aménagement pour déterminer les améliorations à apporter. Le Conseil se réjouit de la mise en œuvre de nouvelles règles et procédures en matière d'aménagement, qui simplifieront toutes les questions d'aménagement dont le Conseil est saisi pour que sa prestation de services demeure efficiente et fructueuse.

En réponse à la pandémie de COVID-19, la Commission a dû modifier sa façon de faire plusieurs fois pour se conformer aux ordres de santé publique. La Commission a traité un certain nombre de questions au moyen de vidéoconférences ou des plateformes virtuelles. C'est non sans difficulté que la Commission est parvenue à assumer sa lourde charge de travail tout en augmentant sa productivité.

En 2021, la Commission a constaté une hausse significative des règlements d'emprunt en vertu de la Loi sur les municipalités. La plupart de ces emprunts ont été gérés de manière administrative, et seulement quelques-uns ont exigé une audience. De plus, lorsque cela était permis, la Commission a organisé la tenue d'audiences liées à l'aménagement dans différentes municipalités de la province.


Au 31 décembre 2021, la Commission comptait 15 membres, y compris le président et la vice-présidente. Les membres de la Commission ont régulièrement participé à des séances d'information pour administrateurs, au congrès annuel du Manitoba Council of Administrative Tribunals, ainsi qu'aux séances d'orientation et de formation interne de la Commission. En raison de la COVID-19, les conférences et les séminaires ont été donnés en ligne.

En tant que tribunal quasi judiciaire, la Commission est régie par les règles de justice naturelle, qui exigent, entre autres choses, le traitement juste et équitable de toutes les parties. Afin d'offrir ses services aux municipalités et au grand public d'une manière équitable, transparente et professionnelle, la Commission examine régulièrement, à des fins de mise à jour, ses politiques et procédures ainsi que son engagement à fournir tous les documents dans les deux langues officielles. Elle veille également à tenir son site Web à jour, et à répondre aux questions du grand public dans les meilleurs délais et le plus complètement possible. L'équipe de direction se réunit régulièrement avec les membres de la Commission pour discuter des mises à jour juridiques et administratives, partager leurs expériences liées aux appels et aborder d'autres questions pertinentes.
