General labelling provisions of NOM-051

NOM-051-SCFI/SSA1-2010: General Labelling Standard for pre-packaged foods and non-alcoholic beverages for direct retail sale to consumers: http://www.economianoms.gob.mx/normas/noms/2010/051scfissa1mod.pdf

Mandatory information in Spanish that according to NOM-051 must appear in the labels of pre-packaged foods and non-alcoholic beverages for retail sale.



Health and Nutritional Claims

- According to section 6 of NOM-051, no pre-packaged food or non-alcoholic beverage shall be described or presented in a false, ambiguous or deceiving manner to consumers. The NOM also prohibits certain claims such as:
 - Claims that cannot be proven
 - Claims about the usefulness of a food or non-alcoholic beverage, to prevent, relieve, treat or cure a disease or physiological disorder.
 - Claims that a given food constitutes an appropriate source of ALL essential nutrients
- Exporters strongly advised to work with their Mexican importers and/or private verification units authorized by the Mexican government to certify that labels and claims comply with the NOM-051:

Health and Nutritional Claims

- NOM-051 also states that health and nutritional claims may refer to the content of energy, proteins, dietary fiber, vitamins and minerals, among others. Some of the claims considered in NOM-051 are:
 - Claims highlighting the level of a given nutrient contained in the product. Examples: "Source of Calcium"; "High Content of Fiber and Low in Fat"
 - Claims indicating the absence of certain components, according to the applicable provisions. Example: "Gluten free", "Sugar free", etc.
 - Claims describing the physiological function of a nutrient contained in the product for the growth, development and normal functioning of the body.
 Example: "Nutriment X helps in X body function, and is found in Food X"
 - Claims indicating that a food product has acquired a special or superior nutritional value thanks to the addition of nutrients, in accordance with applicable regulations. Example: "Food product enriched with X nutrient"

Amendment to NOM-051-SCFI/SSA1-2010

- March 27, 2020: Amendment to the Mexican Official Standard: NOM-051-SCFI/SSA1-2010 – "Labelling of pre-packaged foods and non-alcoholic beverages for retail sale".
- The labelling changes are <u>mandatory</u> for both domestic and <u>imported</u> products, and aim to encourage Mexicans to adopt a healthier diet and fight diseases such as obesity and diabetes.
- Implementation in 3 stages:
 - 1. First Stage: Dec. 1, 2020 Sept. 30, 2023 (INCLUDES MAJOR CHANGES). Some provisions came into effect on April 1, 2021.
 - **2. Second Stage:** October 1, 2023 September 30, 2025
 - 3. Third Stage: October 1, 2025 onward

Amendment to NOM-051-SCFI/SSA1-2010

- Non-compliant products removed from the Mexican shelves as of <u>Dec. 1</u>, <u>2020</u> or not allowed to be sold in Mexico. Food producers, importers and traders could also be subject to penalties if non-compliant.
- Companies are strongly advised to work with their Mexican importers and/or private verification units authorized by the Mexican government to certify that labels comply with the Amendment to NOM-051:

- Following is a summary of SOME key labelling changes, but companies should review all changes in the full text of the Amendment to NOM-051: http://www.dof.gob.mx/2020/SEECO/NOM_051.pdf (only available in Spanish).

- In order to encourage a healthy diet, as of <u>Dec. 1, 2020</u>, black, octagonal-shaped warning seals with the word <u>"Excess"</u> are required to appear in the front-of-package (FOP) of foods and non-alcoholic beverages that meet 2 conditions:
 - 1) That have "added" sugars, fats or sodium, and
 - 2) That "exceed" certain pre-established thresholds

• Labels must include as many warning signs as applicable (from 1 up to 5) in the following order

from left to right:









• Products with a FOP ≤40 cm² should include **only ONE seal** indicating the number of components in excessive amount, as follows:



- Details about the size and font type for the seals are available in the Amendment to NOM-051.
- Examples of how the warning seals should be placed when more than 1 seal is required:

a) Two seals



b) Three seals






c) Four seals



d) Five seals



 The warning black seals should appear in the <u>upper right corner of the FOP</u>, except for products with a FOP smaller than 60 cm², in which case the seals would be allowed to appear in any part of the FOP.



• **Exempted products:** some <u>single-ingredient products</u> such as: vegetable oils, animal fats, sugar, honey, salt and cereal flour.

- Following are the thresholds and conditions by stage that determine when black warning seals must be included in the labels of **products with added sugars, fats or sodium (key trigger).**
- Some thresholds become <u>stricter</u> from one stage to the other:

Thresholds for Stage 1 (Dec. 1, 2020 – Sep. 30, 2023)

Applies to products with <u>added</u> sugars, fats or sodium (the criteria to be evaluated depends on the added component)

Notes:

- a) If added sugars are included during the production process, then sugars and energy/calories must be evaluated.
- b) If fats are added during the production process, then saturated fats, trans fats and energy/calories must be evaluated.
- c) If sodium is added during the production process, then only sodium must be evaluated.

Thresholds for Stage 2 (Oct. 1, 2023 – Sep. 30, 2025)

Applies to products with <u>added</u> sugars, fats or sodium (the criteria to be evaluated depends on the added component)

Notes:

- a) If added sugars are included during the production process, then sugars and energy/calories must be evaluated.
- b) If fats are added during the production process, then saturated fats, trans fats and energy/calories must be evaluated.

Thresholds for Stage 3 (Oct. 1, 2025 – onward)

Applies to products with added free sugars, fats or sodium (if any component is added, then ALL criteria to be evaluated)

If no sugars, fats or sodium are added to the product during the production process, benefit of not having to evaluate the product for including warning black seals. However, consult with an expert/authorized verification unit your particular case.


Notes:

These provisions will apply:

- a) If either free sugars, fats or sodium are added to the product during the production process; and
- b) The value of energy, quantity of free sugars (total sugars including added sugar plus the sugar naturally present in the product), saturated fat, trans fat and sodium, exceed the thresholds indicated in the above table.
- c) All the provisions included in section 4.5.3 of the amendment to NOM-051 will be applied once this last stage starts.

Cautionary Legends on Caffeine and Sweeteners

As of <u>Dec. 1, 2020</u>, rectangular-shaped cautionary legends must be used (when applicable) with the following text and in the following format/legend (specific size and font indicated in the text of the NOM):

CONTIENE EDULCORANTES, NO RECOMENDABLE EN NIÑOS

(CONTAINS SWEETENERS, NOT RECOMMENDED FOR CHILDREN)



CONTIENE CAFEÍNA - EVITAR EN NIÑOS

(CONTAINS CAFFEINE - AVOID IN CHILDREN)



 These cautionary legends must be placed below the black warning seals (when applicable).

Use of Stickers and other provisions

 According to an official criteria to evaluate compliance of NOM-051 that Mexico published on July 10, 2020, <u>stickers</u> <u>are allowed on imported products</u>, as long as they comply exactly with all the commercial/sanitary information requirements included in the Amendment to NOM-051: http://dof.gob.mx/nota_detalle.php?codigo=5596558&fecha=1 0/07/2020



- Products without octagonal warning seals or cautionary legends are allowed to include a legend saying: <u>"Este producto no contiene sellos</u> ni leyendas" (This product does not contain warning seals or legends).
- In the nutritional declaration now use available carbohydrates instead
 of total carbohydrates.
 - **Available carbohydrates = Total carbohydrates Dietary fiber**

Other Changes or New Provisions

As of **April 1, 2021** the following changes/new provisions have also been implemented:

- No cartoons, celebrities or athletes allowed on the labels of products with one or more octagonal warning signs.
- Endorsement of products by organizations or associations only allowed if proper scientific documentation is presented, and the products do not exceed one or more octagonal warning signs.
- <u>"Substitute products"</u> are required to include the word "IMITACIÓN" (IMITATION) in capital letters and bold before the name of the product.
- <u>Trans-fats</u> are required to be declared in the labels (not including intrinsic trans fats that are present in dairy or meat ingredients in a natural state).
- Added sugars must be declared as: "azúcares añadidos" (added sugars) in the list of ingredients.

Other Changes or New Provisions

As of **April 1, 2021** the following changes/new provisions have also been implemented:

- <u>The list of allergens</u> that must be declared was extended to include additional products, such as molluscs. In the case of food products with the possibility of cross-contamination of allergens, the following legend needs to be added: "Puede contener..." (May contain).
- In the case of imported products, the following legend is allowed: "fabricado o envasado por o para" (produced or bottled for), followed by the name and address of the importer.
- The name of the product must appear in the main exhibition surface of the product in bold, with a specific size, and using the same font.
- <u>Health and nutritional claims</u> are allowed in products that have octagonal black seals, but under special conditions.

Verification and Compliance of Labels

 The Embassy can provide general guidance about the Amendment to NOM-051. However, given the level of detail of the new labelling requirements and the specifics of each case, <u>Canadian exporters are strongly encouraged to</u> <u>work with Mexican authorized verification units (UVAs)</u> to ensure the labels are compliant with the new NOM-051:

Once the label is approved by the verification unit, it issues a "compliance certificate" that can be presented when the products arrive at the Mexican border to facilitate the inspection/import process.

Exemptions to NOM-051

- The following products can be exempted from complying with the labelling requirements of NOM-051:

- In the past, Mexico accepted that importers presented a letter under oath requesting the exemption, but as of <u>Oct. 1, 2020</u>, Mexican importers need to declare in the "PEDIMENTO" (official document that is presented at Mexican Customs for importing a shipment), a specific identification code to identify the products as excluded from NOM-051.

Exemptions to NOM-051

- For products exempted from complying with NOM-051, Canadian exporters would just need to include a simple label with some general information such as:
 - Name of the product
 - Net content
 - Country of Origin
 - Lot number
 - Name and address of the exporter
 - Name and address of the importer

Exemptions to NOM-051

- Samples can also be exempted from complying with NOM-051 if:
 - The products are only for sampling purposes and not for sale
 - Labelled as samples
 - At the time of import the Mexican customs broker must declare that the products are just samples







NOM-142-SSA1/SCFI-2014 for alcoholic beverages

 NOM-142 establishes labelling provisions for beer and alcoholic beverages



- Product name or generic definition (vino tinto, brandy, ron)
- Brand (uppercase)
- Description destilado, añejado (distilled, aged)
- Name and address of exporter and importer
- Lot (Tracking purposes)
- Preferred consumption date (same format as in food)
- Country of origin (same format as in food)



NOM-142-SSA1/SCFI-2014 for alcoholic beverages

- Quantity volume expressed in I, cl, ml
- Alcoholic content indicated in units followed by the symbol "% vol"
- Precautionary Legend: EL ABUSO EN EL CONSUMO DE ESTE PRODUCTO ES NOCIVO PARA LA SALUD (The abuse in the consumption of this product is hazardous to your health)
- Prohibition symbols (restrictions of alcohol consumption for less than 18 year-old people, pregnant women, and driving under the influence)
- Label must be in Spanish, fixed to bottles
- Tags/Government seals (*Marbetes*): required to import the product, provided by Mexican importer





Other labelling standards for specific products:

- Chocolate NOM-186-SSA1/SCFI-2002: sanitary and commercial information.
- Cereals and bakery products NOM-247-SSA1-2008: Preservation legends, Nutrition facts based, Specific names for flours, Mandatory vitamins and nutrients declaration.
- Milk NOM-222-SCFI/SAGARPA-2018: sanitary and commercial information.
- Cheese NOM-223-SCFI/SAGARPA-2018: sanitary and commercial information.
- Fish and seafood products NOM-242-SSA1-2009: sanitary, microbiologic and labelling provisions.
- Processed meats NOM-213-SSA1-2002: sanitary and commercial information.

Before shipping, make sure to check with your Mexican importer/customs broker the applicable labelling requirements for your products.



Mexican requirements for imports of organics:

- On January 1, 2022, Mexico implemented new import requirements for organics (LPO) stating that any imported products to be sold in Mexico as organic must meet the requirements of the Mexico Organic Standards or be shipped to Mexico under an equivalency arrangement.
- The Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) and its Mexican counterpart (SENASICA) are working on an organic equivalency arrangement yet to be completed. Once this arrangement is finalized, Mexico is expected to accept a certificate issued by an organic certification body under the Canada control system.
- In the meantime, any Canadian product that wants to be sold as organic in Mexico, must be certified by a SENASICA-approved certification body, according to Mexico's new organic products law (LPO).
