She is 73 years young and holds a master's degree in education from the University of Manitoba. Newman retired from education in 2004. He is past chair of the board of directors of Santé en français du Manitoba and a former board member of the Manitoba Continuing and Long-Term Care Association (LTCAM) and of the Manitoba Association for Residential and Community Housing for the Elderly (MARCHE).

Rob Lavin is the executive director of Brandon Seniors for Seniors Co-op. With over 20 years of community economic development involvement, Lavin has built extensive relationship opportunities with the private sector and all levels of government including Indigenous communities and organizations.

Lavin has significant experience and training in leadership, project management and economic development. With Prince 2 project management certification, Lavin has also played key management roles in the implementation of numerous large-scale initiatives throughout Manitoba including high-speed Internet service into 250-plus communities and the action plan implemented for Treasury Board approval on the provincewide Manitoba Public Safety Communications Service (PSCS), replacing the FleetNet system.

Randi Gage

Randi Gage is a retired palliative care and compassionate care specialist with several decades of hands-on care and training program presentation experience. A strong believer in quality health-care and patient-focused end-of-life care, Gage specialized in palliative care through the research, design and presentation of training programs for doctors, nurses and professional caregivers as well as supporting families through compassionate care training programs.

Gage brings to this advisory group an extensive background in cultural and heritage research and writing for various communities within Canada with firsthand experience living and working in cultural diversity of North America, Central America, South America and other locations around the world. contributions to the care and well-being of veterans, and to the remembrance of the contributions, sacrifices and achievements of veterans.

Gage is the recipient of the 2013 Women of Distinction Award for Volunteerism, Advocacy and Community Enhancement.

Doreen Stapleton

Doreen Stapleton's career has spanned decades and included a variety of roles in public service at the municipal level, in the senior sector at the executive level, as a manager in environmental sciences and as an advocate for people with disabilities. In the seniors sector, Stapleton served on the Coalition for Healthy Aging in Manitoba's Age Friendly Environments Working Group, on the board of directors of the Manitoba Association of Senior Centres and as chair of the Municipality of Harrison Park Age Friendly Initiative.

As municipal councillor for the Rural Municipality of Harrison from 2006 to 2014 and the Municipality of Harrison Park from 2014 to 2018, her roles included deputy reeve and member of the finance committee, and she was responsible for union negotiations and the personnel committee. She was the Sandy Lake Endowment Fund board chair, Rossburn Subdivision Trail Association board vice-chair and chair, and a member of the Sandy Lake Handi-Van committee.

On a personal note, Stapleton is a longtime member of the Order of Eastern Star and a career musician, teacher, composer and adjudicator, entertaining for all occasions and age groups and performing monthly at several personal care homes over the last few decades.

Russel E. Albak, MD, CCFP, FCFP, COE

Dr. Russel Albak has been a practicing family physician since 1986 in Manitoba and is the medical director of PRIME: A Health Centre for Seniors at Deer Lodge Centre in Winnipeg.

He has served in many appointments throughout his career including as an occupational health physician with the City of Winnipeg, as examiner with Canadian Civil Aviation Medicine and currently as a lecturer in the department of family medicine at the University of Manitoba. Dr. Albak received his Care of the Elderly professional designation in 2017.

Dr. Albak is the recipient of numerous awards and scholarships, including the Isbister Scholarship for highest standing at the University of Manitoba faculty of science and Dean's Honour Roll.

He is active in personal fitness and enjoys golf, reading and spending time with his family.

Mari-Jean Nachtigall

Mari-Jean Nachtigall is a parent, grandparent and proud Manitoban who was born and raised north of the 54th parallel and continues to have roots in Flin Flon.

After high school graduation, she pursued post-secondary education in Brandon and Winnipeg where she has lived most of her adult life. Nachtigall worked 40-plus years as an administrative professional supporting elected trustees and the head superintendent of an urban school division in Winnipeg.

She is excited to assist in developing strategies to improve daily living for senior Manitobans and looks forward to contributing her perspective on providing supports for senior caregivers and care recipients, access to publicly funded home-care services, safety for seniors living in public and private accommodation, and accessible public transit and transportation, sidewalks, buildings and public facilities.

Nachtigall is also particularly interested in ensuring accommodations and services for seniors experiencing physical and/or mental health challenges, and access to affordable drugs and enhancements to Pharmacare support, particularly concerning drugs essential to maintaining life.

Sherry Janzen

Sherry Janzen's career has spanned over 30 years, focused primarily on caring for the elderly including as a health-care attendant in Saskatchewan, managing a free-standing adult day centre in Kansas and leading Salem Home in Winkler. She graduated with a bachelor of arts degree in gerontology from Wichita State University in Wichita, Kan.

During her tenure at Salem Home and together with the staff, the relationship-centred model of care was developed and implemented. A measurement tool, QUIS-EH-O is used to ensure the residents' lived experience is one where residents find opportunities to flourish. In 2012, the model of care using the measurement instrument received a leading practice designation from Accreditation Canada. Over the years, Salem Home has also developed an expertise in caring for personal care home residents with significant responsive behaviors.

Judith G. Bartlett C.M., MD, CCFP, MSc

Dr. Judith Bartlett is a semi-retired Métis physician and health researcher with decades of experience working with Indigenous Peoples. Her life passion and philosophical base has been creation and use of the holistic Aboriginal Life Promotion Framework. In her career, after returning from northern clinical practice in 1991, Dr. Bartlett spent six years as director of federal Manitoba Region First Nations health programs. She then returned to studies to complete a master's of science in community health. During this period, she refocused her efforts toward her own Métis community.

Completing her master's of science in 2004, she held academic appointments in the University of Manitoba's faculty of medicine as an associate professor and adjunct scientist from 2009 until retiring. Along with research, Dr. Bartlett always did part-time clinical practice, initially as an addictions physician at Health Sciences Centre and later as a family doctor at the Aboriginal Health and Wellness Centre, which she was involved in developing and implementing.

In 2005, to facilitate community-based research, she moved her research program to the Manitoba Métis Federation where she created their health and wellness department that had a policy research focus. She initiated the 2010 provincewide Métis health status report in collaboration with the Manitoba Centre for Health Policy at the University of Manitoba.

Between 2010 and 2015, her department facilitated the Métis and regional health authorities' use of report outcomes in health planning. Additionally, her department produced multiple Métis age and sex-specific research reports on all chronic diseases and cancer, as well as community-based qualitative studies. One such study examined Métis senior and elder needs for aging well in place in rural and remote Métis communities.

Felix Walker

Felix Walker is the executive director of NCN Family and Community Wellness Centre. As part of their services, the centre oversees elder care in the community both at home and at the personal care home. The centre actively supports residents in Nelson House, South Indian Lake, Leaf Rapids and Thompson with offices in Winnipeg and Brandon.
