

Post-Secondary Tuition Fees and Student Fees Policy Consultation

Manitoba Advanced Education, Skills and Immigration

Date of Collection: April 8 to May 21, 2022

Number of Respondents: 607

Background and Context

Until recently, the *Advanced Education Administration Act* used a formula of Consumer Price Index + five per cent to set annual maximum allowable tuition increase levels for universities. Bill 33, *The Advanced Education Administration Amendment Act*, received Royal Assent on May 20, 2021 and removed this legislated formula of tuition increase. The amendment established the authority of the Minister of Advanced Education, Skills and Immigration to implement guidelines and regulations to regulate university tuition and fees and set tuition and fee guidelines in regulations for colleges. The minister committed to meaningfully consult with all partners, including the public, to obtain input to inform the development of a tuition and student fees policy for Manitoba.

Engagement Overview

The survey on post-secondary tuition and student fees policy was available for public input from April 8 to May 21, 2022, through the EngageMB web portal. The survey was announced via news release and it was promoted through the communications functions of the portal, the government's social media channels, and through direct invitation to key post-secondary and industry stakeholders.

The feedback received from this survey will be used to inform our path forward. The goal is to develop a policy that continues to support affordability and access to post-secondary education for students, ensures our universities and colleges remain sustainable and responsive to the needs of Manitoba's economy, and respects the established governance autonomy of post-secondary institutions.

What We Heard

There were 607 completed Post-Secondary Tuition Fees and Student Fees Policy surveys submitted through the EngageMB portal. The following data provides a view into the perspectives provided in those 607 responses, and some demographic information about the individuals who provided those responses.


Survey Results are organized by three respondent types, including Students, Faculty/Board/Other PSE staff and General Public.

Faculty/Board/Other PSE staff includes respondents who indicated they were either a faculty member, a board member or non-faculty staff at a university or college in Manitoba.

General Public includes respondents who indicated they were any other type of stakeholder, including representatives of organizations, former students, parents of students, prospective parents and students, and the members of the general public.













Note: 13.1 per cent of the respondents reported variables in terms of when **post-secondary institution or programs** should be exempt from the **future policy**, whereas 82.3 per cent of respondents reported variables in terms of when **students** should be exempt from **tuition fees and student fees**.

Other Feedback

When asked "Do you have any other feedback or comments you would like to share at this time", there were 283 responses. Responses were analyzed for key themes, and organized according to the feedback described by the survey respondent.

Key Themes	Respondents' Feedback
The future tuition fees and student fees policy should limit or eliminate tuition fees	Respondents shared feedback such as: "Tuition fees need to be capped and frozen", "Tuition should be free", "Tuition should be affordable for everyone". The responses organized under this theme suggested that the future tuition fees and students fees policy should limit or eliminate tuition fees.
Autonomy of Post-Secondary Institutions	Respondents shared feedback such as: "Government oversight in education should not occur", "The government should stop interfering with post-secondary institutions", "Governments should not be involved in setting tuition fees", and "Tuition should be set by the Post-secondary institution". The responses organized under this theme suggested the future tuition and student fees policy should secure full autonomy to post-secondary institutions on tuition fees.
Differentiated tuition fees should not be implemented by government	Respondents shared feedback such as: "No to differential tuition fees", "Differential tuition fees would erode student choice over their career paths and disproportionately impact lower income families", "Differential tuition is an underhanded way to try and eliminate programs", and "The government definitely should not be setting different fees for different programs". In a limited number of instances, respondents shared their reasoning for possibly implementing differentiated tuition, such as, "We must charge more for programs that get graduates [a] job quicker in order to better resource it". The responses organized under this theme suggested that differential tuition for specific programs is not recommended, and if it is considered, it should be linked to employability.

Key Themes	Respondents' Feedback
The impact of tuition fees and student fees are connected to other financial matters.	Respondents shared feedback such as: "If the government is going to limit tuition fees and increases, its [operating] grants to universities and colleges should make up the difference", "Increase funding to post-secondary institutions" and "To ensure accessibility, the province should focus on how they can support students through bursaries, scholarships or low- interest/ forgivable loans". The responses organized under this theme centered on the suggestions of increasing funding to post-secondary institutions and increasing opportunities for student aid and bursaries to increase the accessibility of a post-secondary education.
Perspectives on student fees	Respondents shared differing feedback regarding student fees, such as: "Optional student fees is a good idea" "Being able to opt out on some student fees would be great because not everybody uses recreational spaces such as gym" "Government should not be involved in determining student fees" "Student fees should be kept as low as possible" Transparency of student fees The responses organized under this theme centered on the differing perspectives that ranged from optional student fees, keeping student fees low, and no involvement from government when determining student fees.
International tuition fees and student fees	Respondents shared varying feedback, such as: "Increase the number of international students - reduce their FEES! Cover their health care", "International students should have to pay actual costs to attend", "Fees should be equal between Canadians and international students" and "Foreign students should pay a hefty fee.". The responses organized under this theme centered around reducing tuition fees and student fees for international students and covering health care insurance costs.

The responses organized under this theme suggest the need for students to be involved in consultations with government and post-secondary institutions.

Concerns with the survey	detail and clarity of many of your survey items made it difficult to answer completely", "I didn't really understand what was meant by tuition and fees "classes"", "Some questions in the survey used ambiguous terminology", "None of your questions were around asking if the government should increase its contribution to post-secondary institutions after its deep cuts in recent years" and "Some questions would benefit from having an "I don't know" or "Not applicable" option." The responses organized under this theme centered on issues identified in the survey and suggested improvements for future surveys.

Next Steps

Each respondent's participation in the survey was appreciated and very valuable. The results of this engagement, and those of other stakeholder consultations, will inform the development of a new tuition fees and student fees policy for Manitoba. Once the policy is developed, institutions will have reasonable notice to prepare for implementation. It is anticipated that new policy will not be implemented before 2023/24 school year.
