


Message from the Assistant Deputy Minister

Elmwood ECE Receives Prestigious Honour from Lieutenant Governor

On Monday, April 7, 2025, Lucille Leclerc was presented with a King Charles III Coronation Medal in recognition of her 50 years as an ECE III and her outstanding commitment to providing child care to the community of Elmwood. The Medal was presented at Government House by The Honourable Anita Neville, Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba, along with The Honourable Wab Kinew, Premier of Manitoba, and MLA Jim Maloway.

Lucille was the founding director of Munroe Day Nursery in 1974, and Cobourg Day Nursery in 1976. Lucille's 1976 application for a Community Improvement Program Grant funded by three levels of government led to the construction of a brand new facility at 75 Brazier Street. The centre was renamed Elmwood Day Nursery, and is where Lucille has been and continues to be the Executive Director for the last 49 years.

The staff of Early Learning and Child Care extend our congratulations to Lucille and commend her for her outstanding long-term work in service to children and families in Winnipeg.

O.K. on a Roll at Constable Finney School

Program proving the nomadic approach to child care space can work

Imagine moving into your first home and setting up a cozy living room space with a safe and engaging play area for young children. Then imagine having to disassemble and put away every piece of furniture, every plant, book, toy, poster and rug—leaving nothing behind—at 9 a.m., only to set it all up again by mid-afternoon. And then repeat—every single weekday.

For most people, it sounds like quite a chore, but for dozens of child care facilities across Manitoba, it's just part of the routine for a successful roll-away program.

"It's a bit like Tetris," says Brenda Bachinsky, Executive Director of O.K. Before and After School Child Care Centres. "It's always a bit challenging, moving and fitting everything, but we have gotten better and better at it over time. We're so efficient now, a visitor might never know the room has to be set up and taken down every day."

'Roll-away,' or 'pull-out' programs are common in school-based child care centres, where facilities have agreements to share school division space and resources. Centres will often set up before and after school in gymnasiums, libraries, or classrooms to accommodate school-age (ages 6-12) children, then take everything down again during the day to make way for classes. Roll-aways are also common in spaces like community centres, where equipment must be put away to accommodate evening and weekend events.

O.K. Before & After School C.C, founded in 1984, operates five programs in Winnipeg, with two being roll-aways. Balwinder Khangura is Site Manager at O.K.'s <u>Ecole Constable Edward Finney School</u> (CEF) location in The Maples. Each weekday at 9 a.m., school-age children are off to their classes and Balwinder and her team of three set to work dismantling their space inside CEF's early-years gymnasium.

At 2:30 p.m., the team have roughly 30 minutes to turn the gymnasium back into a fun and relaxing space for the children to enjoy until closing at 6 p.m.

"We really strive to make it a safe, comfortable space for the children." says Khangura, "We don't want to sacrifice anything just because it's a roll-away program. The plants, decorations, art, and natural colours make it feel cozy. Everything we do is guided by our values, which we have on display for everyone that comes into our program. Those values guide our approach to delivering a high-quality program."

"We've had new teachers or substitute teachers in the school see this and they can't believe it. 'When was this set up?, they ask, 'Is this not a gym anymore?"

The program has almost everything on wheels, and uses light-weight, easy to carry items throughout the set up. Art is hung with no-damage adhesive hooks. But the true success of the program hangs on one factor: teamwork.

"We have a great relationship with the school and division," says Khangura," They go above and beyond with sharing resources and keeping us informed on things. Balwinder and her staff are so organized, efficient, and enthusiastic—the program just couldn't be as successful without this outstanding team effort."

On April 9, O.K. Before & After's other roll-away program at O.V. Jewitt School was recently featured as part of a Manitoba Child Care Association workshop on creating successful roll-away programs. The Journey of a Roll-Away Program tour visited O.K. Before & After at O.V. Jewitt, Sunny Mountain at Governor Semple Children's Place, and Seven Oaks Child Day Care Centre at Morrison School.

Each month, the division will answer a common inquiry received from facilities in a question-and-answer format.

This Month's Question

How much can a child care worker in Manitoba expect to be paid?

Answer

Manitoba's ELCC wage grid provides guidance to licensed and funded child care facilities in recommending equitable and competitive salary scales across employee positions and classifications.

In Centres, boards of directors are responsible for establishing wages. This approach preserves the authority of boards while ensuring consistent and better wages are provided to the early learning and child care workforce. Boards are encouraged to pay hourly wages higher than the Starting Point as the facility's budget allows. However, wages should not fall below the Starting Point and should support employees being paid on average, at or above the Target.

Accessible Information and Communication Standard Regulation—May 1, 2025

The Accessible Information and Communication Standard Regulation under *The Accessibility for Manitobans Act*, builds on existing requirements of Manitoba's Human Rights Code and requires organizations to identify, remove, and prevent barriers that exist digitally, in-print, or through interaction with technology or people.

All licensed early learning and child care centres, including nursery schools, as well as family and group child care home providers with one or more employees (including casual staff), are required to comply before May 1, 2025.

Mental Health Week—May 5 to 11

The Canadian Mental Health Association has designated May 5 to 11 as <u>National Mental Health Week</u>. This year focuses on **Unmasking Mental Health**, recognizing that living with a mental health challenge is hard enough; but masking can make it even harder.

Like many professions, child care comes with a host of physical, emotional, and cognitive challenges that can take their toll on an individual's mental well-being.

CMHA has recently launched a mental health toolkit available for free to all Canadians. Early child care providers are encouraged to take time this month to consider their own mental health, and the mental health of those they work with and care for.



The Public Sector Compensation Disclosure Act Declaration—May 30, 2025

The <u>Public Sector Compensation Disclosure Act</u> requires annual information about funding received from Government, including funding provided to support wages. Eligible facilities are required to comply with the provisions of the Act, including the Declaration form, which must be signed and returned to the Department of Education and Early Childhood Learning by May 30, 2025. 
The next cohort starts on **May 20, 2025**. Participants will be compensated.
