# Moving Forward on Child Care Priorities

# Canada and Manitoba Investment in New Hospital, School, and Post-Secondary Spaces

Announcement calls for 700 new child care spaces in hospitals, schools, and post-secondary institutions (PSIs), as well as funding for professional training and curriculum.

On Tuesday, February 18, 2025, at St. Boniface Hospital, then Families, Children and Social Development federal Minister Jenna Sudds and Manitoba Education and Early Childhood Learning Minister Tracy Schmidt announced that three health care facilities, six schools, and two post-secondary institutions (PSIs) across the province will soon open new, high-quality, flexible child care spaces for children under the age of seven.

In February 2025, the governments of Manitoba and Canada completed negotiations for an action plan under the infrastructure funding annex to the Canada-Wide ELCC Agreement. This plan outlines how Manitoba, through the Health and Child Care Infrastructure Project will invest \$20.9 million in federal funding over three years to support the creation of approximately 324 quality and flexible child care spaces in three health care facilities across the province.

Manitoba also announced the creation of an additional 256 new child care spaces in partnership with school divisions and 128 new child care spaces in post-secondary institutions for children under seven.

- For school divisions, these investments will provide new infant and preschool child care spaces through six new <a href="School-Based Child Care Centre Expansion Projects">School-Based Child Care Centre Expansion Projects</a>, in addition to the 36 previously announced projects.
- For post-secondary institutions, the additional investments will create new infant and preschool spaces at Red River College Polytechnic and University College of the North's Thompson campus through the Post-Secondary Child Care Expansion Project in addition to the nine previously announced projects.

The new spaces will have a positive ripple effect by providing additional support to health care workers and students in need of affordable and flexible child care for their families.



To support the growth in spaces, continued investments under the Canada-Manitoba Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child Care Agreement in the workforce include:

- Programming that educates and helps employ up to 75 Ukrainian newcomers, through partnership with the Manitoba Métis Federation (MMF).
- Programming to train 30 Indigenous students to work in the child care profession, through partnership with The Urban Circle Training Centre.
- New one-time Outdoor Early Childhood Education Grant (closed February 14, 2025) that will provide funding to child-care facilities to enhance current outdoor and land-based programming or create new nature education programming in which licensed non-profit centres (including nursery schools) can receive up to \$25,000 and licensed home-based providers can receive up to \$2,500.
- A Tuition Reimbursement that offers up to \$5,000 per school year to help cover out-of-pocket tuition-related costs for Manitoba students at recognized early childhood education programs offered at post-secondary institutions in the province. Since 2022, the program has provided over \$6.1 million in tuition reimbursement.

A Request for Proposals was issued in October 2024 to develop 29 stand-alone child care centres on school property over the next two years leveraging modular building technology. A similar development method has been used to construct 22 high-quality child care facilities across the province through the Municipalities and Indigenous Governing Bodies' Ready-to-Move Child Care Initiative. These Ready-to-Move child care centres have been constructed in an average of nine months, from piles being poured to occupancy. An information session with participating school divisions will be organized in Spring 2025 to kick off the next phase of the School Based Child Care Expansion Project.

# **DID YOU KNOW**

As of February 2025 nearly 8,300 spaces have opened and more than 6,650 spaces have been committed since 2021, for a total of almost 15,000 new spaces for children twelve and under throughout Manitoba. This includes 4,300 opened spaces and 5750 committed spaces for children under seven, in partnership with the government of Canada. Additionally, through provincial investments, nearly 4,000 additional school ages spaces have opened and almost 900 school age spaces have been committed.

# Canada Announces an Additional 36.8 Billion Dollars for Child Care and Launches a National Child Care Workforce Campaign



Over the past two months, Manitoba has worked closely with our federal partners on a plan to extend our current early learning and child care agreements.

On March 6, 2025, the Government of Canada announced it had reached agreements with 11 of the 13 provinces and territories, including Manitoba, resulting in an additional \$36.8 billion invested in child care across the country for the period ending in 2031. Beginning in 2027/2028, provinces and territories will also receive a three per cent funding increase every year. For Manitoba, this will mean an additional \$1.9 billion in child care funding that will continue to support important investments for increased access to affordable, quality child care and a stronger child care workforce.

One year ago, in March 2024, *The Canada Early Learning and Child Care Act*, received Royal Assent, enshrining the guiding principles for federal investments in a Canada-wide early learning and child care system where families have access to affordable, high-quality, flexible, and inclusive programs and services no matter where they live. This included a federal commitment to maintaining long-term funding.

Manitoba currently holds two funding agreements for early learning and child care with the Government of Canada. The agreements are:

- The Canada-Manitoba Early Learning and Child Care Agreement (Bilateral)
- The Canada-Manitoba Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child Care Agreement (Canada-Wide)
  - The Infrastructure Funding Annex to the Canada-Wide Agreement provides additional funding to support capital space creation.

These agreements establish a partnership between Canada and Manitoba to grow Manitoba's early learning and child care system.

Manitoba's overall goals will remain the same under the extensions, which include affordable, accessible, high-quality, inclusive child care for children under seven; and continuing to grow and strengthen the child care workforce, providing competitive wages and increasing the number of qualified early childhood educators.

To support recruitment of the future child care workforce, Economic and Social Development Canada has also launched a national advertising campaign that will run most of March and again in late spring to promote the early childhood education profession as a career of choice and to support workforce recruitment into the early learning and child care sector.

#### **Budget 2025 Highlights: Early Learning and Child Care**

On March 20, 2025, the Manitoba government announced Budget 2025, which commits additional funding to support families and our early learning and child care sector. Specific commitments focused on fostering healthy children, families, and communities include the following:

- Under the Canada-Wide Agreement with the federal government, Manitoba will create more than 4,600 new and affordable child care spaces including hundreds of flexible child care spaces in hospitals in Winnipeg and Brandon for children under the age of seven.
- Infrastructure and capital allocations with investments in building 11 new schools creating hundreds of new child care spaces, including 880 new school-age child care spaces.
- Maintaining \$10-a-day child care for all licensed and funded child care spaces, including school age spaces on non-school days.
- Continuing to offer subsidies for eligible families to ensure costs are not a barrier to accessing quality early learning and child care.

# Spotlight on Success

#### Helping to Shape the Future in Eastman

On Tuesday, February 25, 2025, the department, in collaboration with the Hanover School Division, hosted an Early Learning and Child Care Career Fair in Steinbach. The event was well received by participants and welcomed 30 people, including representatives from four child care centres.

The Early Learning and Child Care Career Fair was open to all members of the Eastman community who were interested in learning more about starting a rewarding career in child care. The department led an information session about the benefits of pursuing a career in child care and the training options available. Centres in attendance also had the opportunity to talk about their centre and what they are looking for in potential employees. Participants were encouraged to bring their resume and to directly connect with centres who were hiring.

#### Meet the ELCC Team

#### Debbie Huebner, ECE III, Child Care Coordinator

I believe that having been a child care centre director prior to becoming a coordinator has been a huge asset in learning this role and advancing my understanding. It's very interesting seeing things from both sides.

I always loved working with children and being around children. I took a child care course and had the opportunity to work in a child care centre, which I really enjoyed. That's when I started pursuing my education. I received my Early Childhood Educator (ECE) II certificate from Université de Saint-Boniface in June of 1993.

I started at a centre in Transcona in March 1994 as a supervisor. I took evening courses at Red River College Polytechnic while working, and received my ECE III, focusing on children with special needs. I made my way up to assistant director, and then it was a good 15 years as a director before coming to Early Learning and Child Care in government in 2023.

The child care sector has grown tremendously over thirty years. How we're portrayed has improved. Way back, we were considered 'babysitters,' but now our profession is recognized, which is really nice to see. There have been so many different things implemented to benefit children, centres, and families. Integration with the education side of things has been a positive. I think that helps with recognition and awareness.

Being in the field for so long, my advice is to never stop your professional development. Don't be scared to ask questions, even about simple things. Don't be afraid to specialize, for example in infant or preschool or school age care. Take all the information in from staff that can mentor you. Always be open to new ideas and keep growing and learning throughout your career. It will help you form stronger relationships with the children, their families, and fellow staff.

You can make a difference in the lives of children and families throughout your entire career. I worked in a school age centre for close to thirty years. I remember a child in our care at one point, who came in again years later carrying a little baby car seat of his own. Wow. You really do get to see life come full circle.

#### This Month's Question

What does the Early Learning and Childcare (ELCC)
Building Fund entail and where can I get more
information?

#### **Answer**

The Early Learning and Child Care (ELCC) Building Fund offers capital grant funding to non-profit child care centres that wish to renovate, expand their existing centre, or build a new centre for the purpose of adding child care spaces. This fund provides approved projects with capital funding of up to 60 per cent towards the total eligible project construction costs as follows:

- New infant and pre-school spaces receive funding for 60 per cent of total eligible project costs with no set maximum, in partnership with Canada under the federal child care agreements
- New school-age spaces receive provincial funding for 60 per cent of total eligible project costs and up to a maximum of \$1.2 million, through provincial investments

## Canadian Centre for Child Protection (C3P) Training—Deadline March 31, 2025 (No Cost)

In May 2024, ELCC partnered with the Canadian Centre for Child Protection (C3P) to deliver an online child sexual abuse prevention training program for all child care staff in Manitoba. The program is intended to create a model for early childhood educators to help detect and prevent child abuse in Canada.

As a reminder, licensed child care facilities including Early Childhood Educators, Child Care Assistants, and home-based child care providers (including substitutes) are required to complete this mandatory training by March 31, 2025, and every four years thereafter.

# **Accessible Information and Communication Standard Regulation**

The Accessible Information and Communication Standard Regulation under The Accessibility for Manitobans Act, builds on existing requirements of Manitoba's Human Rights Code and requires organizations to identify, remove, and prevent barriers that exist digitally, in-print, or through interaction with technology or people.

All licensed early learning and child care centres, including nursery schools, as well as family and group child care home providers with one or more employees (including casual staff), are required to comply before May 1, 2025.

## **BEAM Program—Seeking Participants for May 2025**

Dr. Leslie Roos at the Children's Hospital Research Institute of Manitoba along with the University of Manitoba have been implementing BEAM (Building Emotional Awareness and Mental Health), a 12-week app-based program to promote family mental health and reduce parenting stress. It's designed for Manitoba parents with children aged 2 to 5 years. Through this online, self-paced program, parents can choose to access learning modules when it works best for them. The weekly time commitment is around 60 minutes.

The modules offer practical advice on parenting and mental health. Parents will learn how to navigate strong emotions, effective communication skills, and supportive parenting techniques to foster family relationships and well-being. BEAM has been shown to reduce mental health problems and improve parent-child relationships.

The next cohort starts on May 20, 2025. Participants will be compensated.

#### **ELCC Provincial Staff Meeting**

On Thursday and Friday, February 6 and 7, Early Learning and Child Care Division staff from across the province gathered for the 2025 ELCC Provincial Meeting at Centro Caboto Centre. More than 130 staff and guests met to reflect on the work of 2024 and chart the path forward in 2025 and beyond.

Presentations included *Early Childhood Education in Canada*, by Dr. Emis Akbari, a professor with the School of Early Childhood, George Brown College, University of Toronto. Dr. Akbari led a compelling seminar and interactive session guided by her research on policy related to early childhood development and education at all levels of government, comparing Canada to other developed economies, and examining the status of the Early Childhood Educator (ECE) workforce in Ontario.

We welcomed Sarah Gazan, Director of Indigenous Excellence, and Wade Houle, Curriculum Lead on Land-Based Education and Indigenous Languages, to facilitate an anti-racism workshop focusing on anti-racism and anti-oppression education. The workshop provided an opportunity to learn about, reflect on, and find ways to take action to address bias, racism, and inequity and improve outcomes for children and families.

We also heard inspiring words from Elder Ivy Chaske, Minister Schmidt, and Deputy Minister O'Leary, and took time to recognize several members of our team for their exemplary years of service.
