Armistice Terms Will Be Told to Congress Today

President Wilson Will Read Terms of Armistice to Joint Session of Congress Called For One o'Clock—Premier Clemenceau to Announce Terms at Same Hour

WA, Nov. 11.—The position in order to report for service under the Military Service act, turned up here immediately notification was received that the armistice was signed.

Under terms of the armistice Germany is in possession of the government for several days and no further hostilities are to mean an end of the war, al-

though conditions in Germany necessitate the retention of a considerable force for a time.

## 5,000 CANNONS ALSO GIVEN UP TO ALLIES

Victory Anthems Swell as Joyfest Rages in Winnipeg

Down-Town Streets Are Choked With Cheering, Rooting Popular

Citizens Glad War Is Ended

"Peace With Victory — Thank God" Is Expression of Freed Men

TREATIES OF BREST-LITOVSK AND BUCHAREST ABROGATED; FOE RETIRES BEYOND RHINE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—A session of the senate and house opened to consider the armistice conditions granted to Germany.

The salient points follow:

The Germans evacuate all occupied territories.

Agree to withdraw from the left bank of the Rhine.

Surrender all supplies of war, including 5,000 cannon.

Abandon the treaties of Bucharest and Brest-Litovsk.

Surrender 160 submarines, 50 destroyers, six battle cruisers,

10 battleships, eight light cruisers and other ships.

A soldiers' council has been formed at the front and will submit its demands to Field-Marshal von Hindenburg today, according to a Wolff Bureau dispatch from German general headquarters received here Monday.

Kaiser and Crown Prince  
Flee to Holland

### ARMISTICE SIGNED Hostilities Have Stopped

(By The Associated Press.)  
Washington, Nov. 11.—The world war will end this morning at 6 o'clock Washington time. The armistice was signed by the German representatives at midnight. This announcement was made by the state department at 2:50 this morning.

This announcement was made verbally by an official of the state department in this form:

The armistice has been signed. It was signed at 5 o'clock a.m. Paris time and hostilities will cease at 11 o'clock this morning, Paris time.

There was no information as to the circumstances under which the armistice was signed, but since the German courier did not reach German military headquarters until 10 o'clock yesterday morning, French time, it was generally assumed here that the German envoys within the French lines had been instructed by wireless to sign the terms.

### Revolution Bulletins

BERLIN, via London.—An official announcement made here today said: "On account of the proximity of peace, the bread ration will be increased Dec. 1. It is essential to keep order. Disturbances impede the importation of foodstuffs."

PARIS.—The food situation in Berlin and other centres of population in Germany is seriously compromised owing to imports.

### KAISER ABDICATES Crown Prince Renounces Throne

London, Nov. 9.—(British Admiralty Wireless.)—A German wireless message received in London, Nov. 9, states:

"The German imperial chancellor, Prince Maximilian of Baden, has issued the following decree:

"The kaiser and king has decided to renounce the throne.

"The imperial chancellor will remain in office until the questions connected with the abdication of the kaiser, the renouncing by the crown prince of the throne of the German empire and of Prussia and the setting up of a government of national unity have been satisfactorily settled."
