In accordance with Rule 33(7), the Government House Leader announced that the Protecting Children and Youth from Viewing Violent, Sexually Explicit Material Online Resolution will be considered on the next Tuesday of Private Members' Business.

By leave, it was agreed for the House to deal with Second Reading of Bill (No. 201).

Mrs. GUILLEMARD moved:

THAT Bill (No. 201) – The Service and Therapy Animal Day Act/Loi sur la Journée des animaux d'assistance et de zoothérapie, be now read a Second Time and be referred to a Committee of this House.

The Bill was accordingly read a Second Time and referred to a Committee of this House.

Mr. LAGIMODIERE moved:

Resolution No. 2: Reducing the Devastating Effects of Illicit Opioids

WHEREAS fentanyl is a powerful synthetic opioid narcotic that can appear in the form of pills, powder or liquid; and

WHEREAS law enforcement agencies in Manitoba, across the country, and around the world are dealing with an emerging opioid crisis; and

WHEREAS the Provincial Government has called upon the Federal Government to take immediate action to stop the flow of illicit substances like fentanyl and other opioids into Canada from other countries; and

WHEREAS the Official Opposition has lobbied for a non-effective, short term and fractured approach instead of working collaboratively on a strengthened national strategy; and

WHEREAS the Provincial Government has committed to expanding access to the lifesaving drug Naloxone; and

WHEREAS a national response is required to prevent the spread of opioids across the country so no more families are impacted by the effects of these illicit substances.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba be urged to support the Provincial Government in its continued work and partnership with the Federal Government and law enforcement agencies to reduce the devastating effects of illicit opioids like fentanyl.

RESOLVED that a sum not exceeding \$528,000,000, being approximately 75% of the total amount authorized by The Appropriation Act, 2016, to be voted as set out in Part B (Capital Investment) of the 2016 Estimates, be granted to Her Majesty for the Fiscal Year ending the 31st day of March, 2018.
Resolutions were reported and the Report was received.
Hon. Mr. FRIESEN moved:
THAT there be granted to Her Majesty on account of Certain Expenditures of the Public Service for the Fiscal Year ending March 31, 2018 out of the Consolidated Fund, sums not exceeding \$4,700,000,000, being approximately 35% of the total amount authorized by The Appropriation Act, 2016 to be voted as set out in Part A (Operating Expenditure) and \$528,000,000, being approximately 75% of the total amount authorized by The Appropriation Act, 2016 to be voted as set out in Part B (Capital Investment) of the 2016 Estimates.
And the Question being put. It was agreed to.
On motion of Hon. Mr. FRIESEN, (No. 8) – The Interim Appropriation Act, 2017/Loi de 2017 portant affectation anticipée de crédits, was read a First Time and ordered for Second Reading immediately.
