Resolution No. 3: Calling on the Provincial Government to Implement a Volunteer Tax Credit

WHEREAS Manitoba's volunteers play an essential role in strengthening communities, supporting charities, non-profits, and public services through their unpaid contributions; and

WHEREAS the Provincial Government has failed to provide meaningful incentives to encourage and reward volunteerism, despite the rising costs of living that create financial barriers for many Manitobans who wish to give back to their communities; and

WHEREAS a Volunteer Tax Credit would provide fair recognition for the time and effort volunteers dedicate, encourage increased participation in community service, and help sustain critical non-profit organizations; and

WHEREAS the Provincial Government has the opportunity to show leadership by introducing a tax credit that would directly benefit volunteers, particularly seniors, youth, and those supporting social services and emergency response.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba urge the Provincial Government to act by introducing, and implementing without further delay, a Volunteer Tax Credit in order to ensure that Manitobans who dedicate their time to serving their communities receive financial recognition for their contributions.

On motion of Mr. GUENTER, the Report of the Committee was received.

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Hon. Min. FONTAINE, the Minister responsible for Women and Gender Equity, made a statement regarding March 8, 2025, being International Women's Day.

Ms. BYRAM commented on the statement.

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Pursuant to sub-rule 28(1), Mrs. SCHOTT, Mr. EWASKO, Hon. Min. CABLE, Mr. SCHULER and MLA COMPTON made Member's statements.

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Pursuant to Rule 34, the Opposition House Leader announced that the Private Member's resolution titled "Provincial Government Job-Destroying Payroll Taxes" will be considered on the next Thursday of Private Members' Business.

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Hon. Min. FONTAINE moved:

WHEREAS the Standing Committee on Legislative Affairs recommends to the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba that Jill Perron be reappointed as the Manitoba Ombudsman.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that, pursuant to subsections 2(1), 2(1.1), and 4(1) of *The Ombudsman Act*, Jill Perron be reappointed as the Manitoba Ombudsman.

And the Question being put. It was agreed to.

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The House resumed the debate on the proposed resolution of Hon. Min. FONTAINE:

WHEREAS the tariffs by U.S. President Donald Trump threaten Canada's sovereignty and economic security; and

WHEREAS Manitoba is a powerhouse of clean hydroelectricity, critical minerals, and brilliant, hardworking people who drive innovation and prosperity; and

WHEREAS Manitobans look out for each other as it is the Manitoba way; and

WHEREAS now more than ever, the people of this province need to stick together, stand up for each other, and take decisive action to fight for Manitoban jobs, industries and resources; and

WHEREAS Manitobans are stronger standing together; and

WHEREAS Manitobans love Canada; and

WHEREAS Canada will never become the 51st state.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba stands united in defense of the province, its workers, and its industries against President Donald Trump's tariff tax and threats, which threaten Canada's sovereignty and economic security.

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Mr. WASYLIW asked Written Questions (Nos. 1 to 5) for reply to the following:

1. In 2012, the Province of Manitoba sued major tobacco companies to recover the costs of providing healthcare services for tobacco-related illness. During the election campaign, the now-Provincial Government promised to build a new headquarters for CancerCare. On May 5, 2024, it was reported that the Premier told Manitobans that the tobacco lawsuit had settled, and that the money would be used to construct the new headquarters. The Premier indicated the settlement, ranging from hundreds of millions to up to half of a billion dollars, would arrive by early 2025, yet the province has still not received any money. What is the policy of the Provincial Government in relation to building the CancerCare headquarters and when will it get built?
2. While in Opposition, the NDP held up Bill 22, which overturned a ban on cosmetic pesticides, citing the health of Manitoban children were being placed at risk. On August 29, 2023, during the provincial election campaign, at the Environment and Climate Forum, the NDP pledged that they would reinstate the ban on cosmetic pesticides. What is the Provincial Government's current policy on cosmetic pesticides, and will a new ban be forthcoming?
3. The Provincial Government announced that beginning in February, the Province of Manitoba and the City of Winnipeg will move people into housing from one encampment at a time. What are the criteria for determining which encampment is prioritized to be moved, and when will the Southwood encampment in the University Heights neighbourhood of Fort Garry be scheduled to be moved?
4. During the 2023 election campaign, the Provincial Government pledged to hold gas companies accountable by giving the Public Utilities Board new powers to review, investigate and regulate retail gasoline prices in Manitoba. It was reported that the Premier cited Atlantic provinces that ban 'surge pricing' of gas during the summer and on long weekends as an example. Is this still the policy of the Provincial Government, and when will Public Utilities Board receive those new powers?
5. The Provincial Government committed to reinstating International Student health coverage during the previous election campaign. Is this still the current policy of the Provincial Government and what is the reason for the delay in reinstating this coverage?
