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## **Executive Summary**

#### **Population**

- Statistics Canada estimates Manitoba's July 1, 2024 population at 1,494,301.
- Manitoba's population has increased by 17.0% since July 1, 2014.
- The Economic Region of Winnipeg, consisting of the City of Winnipeg and the Rural Municipality of Headingley, was home to 56.8% of Manitoba's population.
- The Winnipeg region recorded the largest increase in share of Manitoba's population, gaining 1.4 percentage points between 2014 and 2024.
- The regions of Southeast (24.2%) and Winnipeg (19.9%) experienced the strongest rates of population growth from 2014 to 2024.
- Parklands recorded the weakest rate of population growth between 2014 and 2024, increasing by 0.7%.

#### **Age Structure**

- On July 1, 2024, half of Manitoba's population was older than 37.3 years, while the other half was younger.
- The median age for the Economic Region of Winnipeg was 37.4 years, slightly older than the province as a whole.
- In terms of median age, the youngest regions were the North (28.6 years) and South Central (34.8 years). The oldest regions were the Interlake (44.0 years) and Parklands (42.2 years).
- Children aged 14 and under comprised 17.9% of Manitoba's 2024 population. Individuals aged 15 to 64 accounted for 65.2% of Manitobans, while the remaining 16.8% of Manitoba's residents were aged 65 and over.

#### **Components of Population Change**

- There were 15,546 babies born to Manitoba residents during the July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024 period, a decrease of 4.8% from the twelve months ending June 30, 2014.
- Manitoba's annual population growth due to natural change (births minus deaths) has decreased by 58.3% compared to ten years ago.
- The Winnipeg region recorded the largest net intraprovincial outflow, losing 1,891 migrants to other parts of the province during 2023/24. The Southeast region registered the highest net intraprovincial inflow, gaining 1,396 individuals.
- Manitoba lost a net 4,540 residents to other parts of Canada over the 2023/24 period. Compared
  to the net loss in 2013/14, Manitoba's net outflow decreased by 2,311 migrants. Although most of
  Manitoba's Economic Regions registered net interprovincial losses, the North Central region,
  gaining 81 residents, had the largest net inflow.
- Manitoba had a net inflow of 20,067 people from other countries (immigrants minus short- and long-term emigrants) over the 2023/24 period. The Winnipeg region received 79.7% of Manitoba's net international migrants. Second only to Winnipeg, the Southwest region accounted for 10.3% of Manitoba's net international inflow.
- Manitoba had a net inflow of 21,515 temporary residents from other countries (net change in non-permanent residents, plus short- and long-term returning emigrants) over the 2023/24 period. The Winnipeg region received 78.2% of Manitoba's other international migrants. The Southwest region accounted for the second largest share of Manitoba's other international inflow, at 8.3%.

## Introduction

In January 2025, Statistics Canada released the July 1, 2024 population estimates by age and gender for Census Divisions, Census Metropolitan Areas, Census Agglomerations and Economic Regions, as well as total population estimates for Census Subdivisions, and revisions covering the time period 2021/22 onward. The extent of revisions may not be the same for all areas.

This report makes use of Statistics Canada's latest sub-provincial data to illustrate Manitoba's regional differences in population and various components of growth. An analysis of the differing age structure within Economic Regions is also provided. In addition, comparisons to estimates for 2013/14 are examined.

In this report, population estimates are for July 1 of the given year, while components of population change are provided on a Census Year basis (July 1 of the previous year to June 30 of the given year). Occasionally, this report makes use of Census Year notation to describe the period of time being covered. For example, the period July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024 would be denoted as 2023/24.

## The Economic Regions

For statistical purposes, Manitoba's municipalities are grouped into eight Economic Regions (ER). Smaller than an Economic Region, Census Divisions are also formed by aggregating municipalities.





## I. Population by Age Group and Economic Region


## **Regional Population Distribution**

According to Statistics Canada, Manitoba's estimated population for July 1, 2024 was 1,494,301. The majority, 56.8%, lived in the Winnipeg region.

The Southeast (9.6%) and Southwest (8.6%) regions were home to the second and third largest portions of Manitoba's 2024 population, respectively. The fewest Manitobans, 2.8%, lived in the Parklands region.

In comparison to its July 1, 2014 population share, the Winnipeg region recorded a gain of 1.4 percentage points, the largest increase among the regions. The only other region with a gain in share


was Southeast (0.6 percentage points). The North region had the largest decrease in share, dropping by 0.8 percentage points.



## **Regional Population Growth**

The number of Manitobans has increased by 17.0% compared to July 1, 2014. The Winnipeg region accounted for more than half the provincial increase of 216,876 people, gaining 141,153 residents (19.9%).

Two regions met or exceeded Manitoba's growth rate. The Southeast (24.2%) and Winnipeg (19.9%) regions had the strongest growth rates. The majority of the regions, however, experienced moderate rates of growth. Parklands recorded the weakest rate of population growth between 2014 and 2024, increasing by 0.7%.


## Regional Median Age

Manitoba's median age, the age at which half the population is older, and half is younger, was 37.3 years on July 1, 2024. Compared to its 2014 level of 37.8 years, Manitoba's median age has decreased by 0.5 years.

The Winnipeg region had a median age of 37.4 years in 2024, a decrease of 1.0 years compared to its 2014 level of 38.4 years.

In 2024, Manitoba's regions had median ages ranging from a low of 28.6 years in the North, to highs of 44.0 years and 42.2 years, in the Interlake and Parklands, respectively.

Compared to July 1, 2014, five of Manitoba's regions became more youthful. The Parklands region recorded the largest decline in median age, decreasing by 2.8 years. Of the three regions showing median age stability or increases, the Interlake region has aged the most, up 1.9 years.

Of Manitoba's 267,770 children, almost half, 49.2%, resided in the Winnipeg region on July 1, 2024. Throughout the rest of the province, the share of Manitobans aged 14 and under ranged from a low of 3.0% in the Parklands, to a high of 11.1% in the Southeast.

There were 975,016 Manitobans aged 15 to 64 on July 1, 2024. The majority, 59.2%, resided in the Winnipeg region. The balance of Manitoba's working age population resided in the other regions of the province, ranging from a low of 2.5% in the Parklands, to a high of 9.2% in the Southeast.

The Winnipeg region was home to 55.4% of Manitoba's 251,515 residents aged 65 and over on July 1, 2024. Ranging from a low of 3.7% in the North, to a high of 9.7% in the Southwest, the other regions of the province were home to Manitoba's remaining retirement years population.

## Children (14 & Under)



Children aged 14 and under comprised
17.9% of Manitoba's population on July 1, 2024. Compared to the province's July 1, 2014 share of 18.9%, this is a 1.0 percentage point decrease. Over the same period, the Winnipeg region's share decreased by 1.2 percentage points, from 16.7% to 15.5%

The North, at 28.2%, had the highest regional share of children in 2024; roughly three out of every ten residents were younger than 15 years old. At the other extreme, Winnipeg's share of 15.5% was the

Compared to 2014, two of the regions showed an increase in their share of children. The Parklands, up 1.2 percentage points, had the largest increase in share, while the North had the largest decrease, dropping by 2.2 percentage points.



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## Working Age (15 to 64)

The working age population made up 65.2% of Manitoba's total July 1, 2024 population, a decrease of 1.2 percentage points from its 2014 share of 66.4%.

The Winnipeg region, at 68.0%, had the highest share of working age individuals in 2024, down 0.5 percentage points from its 2014 share. The lowest share was in the Parklands, with just under six out of every ten residents, 57.5%, between the ages of 15 and 64.

None of Manitoba's regions showed increases in share between 2014 and 2024. Winnipeg region, showed the smallest decline, down by 0.5 percent.


## Retirement Years (65 & Over)

Residents aged 65 and over comprised 16.8% of all Manitobans on July 1, 2024. Compared to the 2014 share of 14.7%, there has been a 2.1 percentage point increase. The Winnipeg region had a gain in share of 1.6 percentage points, rising to 16.4% in 2024.

The Parklands region, with 23.3%, had the highest share of population aged 65 and over in 2024. The North's share, at 9.7%, was 1.7 times lower than Manitoba's and lowest regionally.

Shares of population aged 65 and over have increased for each region over the past ten years. The Southeast, Interlake and North regions, however, recorded increases in share not only for the 65 and over aggregate, but also all three of the more detailed age groups 65 to 74, 75 to 84 and 85 and over.

Contrary to the change in share for Manitoba's 65 and over population, the majority of Manitoba's regions recorded decreases in their shares of residents aged 85 and over between 2014 and 2024.



## II. Components of Population Change by Economic Region

This section focuses on component levels and their distribution across the province. Table A2 provides rates per thousand population.


## Births, Deaths and Natural Change

#### **Births**

Manitoban women gave birth to 15,546 babies between July 1, 2023 and June 30, 2024.

Nearly half of Manitoba's newborns, 49.0%, were born to women living in the Winnipeg region, while women living in the Parklands region accounted for the smallest portion, at 3.2%.

Since 2013/14, the number of Manitoba births has declined by 791 (4.8%). The North region has lost 2.8 percentage points from its provincial share compared to ten years ago, the largest loss among the regions. The Southeast region experienced the largest increase in




provincial share, with a gain of 1.1 percentage points.

#### **Deaths**

Manitoba recorded 13,030 deaths over the twelve months ending June 30, 2024.

The majority of decedents, 55.5%, had resided in the Winnipeg region, while the North Central region, with 3.4%, registered the lowest share in 2023/24.

Provincially, the number of deaths has increased by 2,728, or 26.5% compared to the 2013/14 period. Over the last ten years, the North region exhibited the largest increase in its provincial share of deaths, gaining 1.3 percentage points. The Parklands region experienced the largest decline in share, decreasing by 0.7 percentage points.




## **Natural Change**

Manitoba's natural change (the number of births minus the number of deaths) was 2,516 for the twelve months ending June 30, 2024.

The largest natural increases were in the North and Southeast regions, accounting for 30.9% and 27.1% of Manitoba's 2023/24 total, respectively. The Parklands region experienced the largest natural decrease, registering 95 more deaths than births.

Manitoba's annual population growth due to natural change has decreased by 58.3% in comparison to its 2013/14 level




of 6,035. Regionally, Winnipeg (decreasing by 22.0 percentage points) and Southeast (increasing by 12.3 percentage points) have experienced the largest shifts in their contribution to Manitoba's natural change.

#### **Migration**

## **Net Intraprovincial Migration**

Net intraprovincial migration classifies the movement of people between the regions of Manitoba. The number of net intraprovincial migrants at the Manitoba level is, by definition, zero.

Over the twelve months ending June 30, 2024, the Winnipeg region recorded the largest net loss among the regions, losing 1,891 people to other parts of the province. At the other extreme, the Southeast region had the largest net intraprovincial inflow over the period, with a net gain of 1,396 residents.



Of all the regions, Winnipeg's net intraprovincial migration has declined the most compared to a decade ago. Winnipeg dropped from a net loss of 570 migrants in 2013/14, to a net loss of 1,891 residents in 2023/24. The Southeast region recorded the most improvement over the same period, increasing from its net gain of 867 individuals, to a net gain of 1,396 residents.


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#### **Net Interprovincial Migration**

Manitoba recorded a net loss of 4,540 people through movements to other parts of Canada over the July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024 period. The Winnipeg region, with a net loss of 3,612 residents, accounted for most of the provincial loss.

Although most of Manitoba's Economic Regions registered net interprovincial losses over the 2023/24 period, the North Central region, gaining 81 residents, had the largest net inflow.

Manitoba's net interprovincial outflow of 4,540 migrants for 2023/24 was 33.7% less than the net outflow of 6,851



migrants for 2013/14. The Southwest region recorded the smallest improvement compared to ten years earlier, losing 30 fewer residents through net interprovincial migration. Winnipeg lost 1,046 fewer people, showing the largest improvement among the regions.


#### **Net International Migration (Permanent)**

Manitoba's more permanent international migration flows are combined as net international migration, defined to be immigrants minus short-term and long-term emigrants. Prior to 2016/17, short-term emigrants were included in the calculation of net temporary emigrants, part of other international migration.

Manitoba had a net inflow of 20,067 people from other countries during the twelve months ending June 30, 2024. The Winnipeg region became home to 15,992 of these new Manitobans, making up 79.7% of the provincial total.

Second only to Winnipeg, the Southwest region accounted for 10.3% of Manitoba's net international inflow during 2023/24, with a net gain of 2,072 residents.

The region making the smallest positive contribution to Manitoba's total was Interlake, with a net inflow of 133 residents, accounting for 0.7% of Manitoba's total.

Province-wide, there was an inflow of 13,909 net international migrants during 2013/14. Since then, Manitoba's net international inflow has grown by 6,158 migrants, a 44.3% increase. Although not strictly comparable due to the exclusion of short-term emigrants from the calculation prior to 2016/17, most of the increase is the result of higher immigration levels, due in large part to Manitoba's Provincial Nominee Program.

Net international migration flows to Winnipeg have increased by 4,164 individuals, compared to ten years ago. Manitoba's other regions experienced moderate changes, with seven of the regions recording increases. Aside from Winnipeg, the Southwest region experienced the largest gain in net international migration, with an increase of 1,090 migrants. The net inflow to the North region declined by 62 migrants, the largest reduction among the regions.

## Other International Migration (Temporary)

Manitoba's more temporary international migration flows are grouped together as *other international migration*, defined as the net change in non-permanent residents, plus short-term and long-term returning emigrants. The majority of non-permanent residents are students and temporary workers, while the remainder are refugee status claimants and non-Canadian born dependants of refugee claimants or permit holders. Prior to 2016/17, net temporary emigration (short-term emigrants minus short-term returning emigrants) was subtracted from other international migration.

Manitoba experienced a net gain of 21,515 other international migrants over the twelve months ending June 30, 2024. With a net inflow of 16,830 individuals, Winnipeg registered the largest net gain among the regions.

The Southwest region had the second highest net gain, with a net inflow of 1,789 other international migrants. The North recorded the smallest regional increase with a net inflow of 128 migrants.

Manitoba's net gain of 21,515 other international migrants for 2023/24 was 10.7 times the net inflow of 2,010

migrants for 2013/14. Although not strictly comparable due to the inclusion of short-term emigrants in the calculation prior to 2016/17, most of the increase is the result of higher numbers of International Mobility Program (IMP) permits, due in large part to the Canada-Ukraine Authorization for Emergency Travel (CUAET). The Winnipeg region exhibited the most improvement, with its net inflow increasing by 15,283 people. None of Manitoba's regions experienced declines in their net flows compared to 2013/14. The North region, with an increase of 121 migrants, had the least improvement.

#### **Total Net Migration**

Combining all the migration components together, Manitoba had a total net inflow of 37,042 migrants over the 2023/24 period. The majority, 27,319 individuals, selected the Winnipeg region as their new home.

The North region recorded the largest total net migration outflow, with a loss of 248 residents. The Parklands experienced the smallest net gain, with an inflow of 196 residents.

Manitoba registered a total net migration inflow of 9,068 individuals during 2013/14. The province has experienced net

interprovincial, net international and other international migration improvements compared to ten years ago. With no worsening in any migration component, this resulted in a total net improvement of 27,974 migrants.


In comparison to a decade ago, Winnipeg's total net inflow has increased by 19,172 migrants, the largest improvement among the regions. The Parklands region recorded the weakest improvement in migration levels, converting to a gain of 196 migrants.

## III. Migration by Age Group and Economic Region

Appendix B presents a regional overview for Manitoba and each Economic Region. Each overview provides a table showing the components of migration by age group (levels and rates), a chart with total net migration rates by age group and a population pyramid displaying the regional age structure.

#### Manitoba

Manitoba's large net international and other international inflows during 2023/24 resulted in positive total net migration for all age groups. The largest total net inflow was of people aged 15 to 24, fortified by a net inflow of 7,000 other international migrants. Influenced by relatively smaller net international and other international inflows. residents aged 65 and




over recorded the smallest total net inflow, at 914 individuals.

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#### **Southeast**


The Southeast region had a total net inflow of 2,960 migrants in 2023/24. People aged 25 to 34 contributed the most to the region's total net inflow, recording 821 migrants. Net intraprovincial inflows fueled migration for most age groups, however, other international migration was the main factor for the age group 15 to 24.



#### **South Central**

Combining all forms of migration, there were 357 people aged 14 and under that relocated to the South Central region during the twelve months ending June 30, 2024. Including a net international inflow of 290 individuals under the age of 15, this age group had a large influence on the region's total net inflow of 1,263 residents.

The age group 35 to




44 had the region's second largest total net inflow, mostly shaped by a net international inflow of 257 migrants.

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
#### Southwest

The Southwest region had a total net inflow of 3.288 migrants over the 2023/24 period. A net inflow of 635 international migrants aged 14 and under, combined with 789 other international migrants aged 15 to 24 contributed the most to the region's total net inflow. With a total net inflow of 1.035 migrants, the age group 15 to 24 was the most influential on the region.



#### **North Central**


The North Central region experienced a total net gain of 805 migrants in 2023/24. This was mostly due to an other international inflow of 290 migrants. The 65 and over age group experienced the only total net migration outflow, losing 41 individuals. The 25 to 34 age group had the most impact on the region. Influenced primarily by an other international inflow of



142 migrants, the age group had a total net inflow of 295 migrants.


## Winnipeg

During 2023/24, there was an inflow of 27.319 total net migrants to the Winnipeg region. Compared to the other age groups, a total net gain of 10,692 migrants aged 15 to 24 influenced Winnipeg's total net inflow the most. The majority of this inflow of individuals aged 15 to 24 was due to 5,299 other international migrants choosing to reside in Winnipeg.




#### Interlake

The Interlake recorded a net intraprovincial inflow of 964 migrants in 2023/24. Compared to the other age groups, the largest share of these intraprovincial migrants were aged 14 and under (375 individuals). These children from other parts of the province comprised the majority of the region's total net inflow of 1,459 individuals.




#### **Parklands**

The Parklands region had an other international inflow of 247 residents over the twelve months ending June 30, 2024. With an inflow of 58 people, the majority of individuals temporarily moving here from other countries were aged 25 to 34. Overall, the region had a total net inflow of 196 migrants.



#### **North**

The North region had a total net outflow of 248 migrants in 2023/24. Net intraprovincial migration was the main influence on the region, with a net outflow of 407 migrants to other parts of the province. At 117 migrants, people aged 25 to 34 made up nearly one-third of the net intraprovincial outflow.








## Manitoba Regional Population Growth, Ten-year Jul 1, 2014 to Jul 1, 2024

## Regional Population Growth, Annual Average





#### Regional Population Distribution, 14 and Under





#### Regional Population Distribution, 15 to 64





#### Regional Population Distribution, 65 and Over





#### Regional Population, Median Age





## Regional Net Migration by Type, Showing Age Group Contributions




## Regional Population Pyramids, Comparison with Manitoba












































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
# Ten-year Population Change by Census Division - Manitoba

Jul 1, 2014 to Jul 1, 2024





# **Median Age by Census Division - Manitoba**





# Percent Share of Population 14 & Under by Census Division - Manitoba





# Percent Share of Population 15 to 64 by Census Division - Manitoba





# Percent Share of Population 65 & Over by Census Division - Manitoba





### **Notes to Readers**

### **Population Estimate**

Estimates are derived from Census counts, but are adjusted for net Census undercoverage, incompletely enumerated Indian reserves and demographic growth.

#### Median Age

The median age of the population is the age at which half the people are older, and half are younger.

#### Gender

Gender refers to an individual's personal and social identity as a man, woman or non-binary person (a person who is not exclusively a man or a woman).

Demographic estimates are available for the gender category "Men+" (includes men and/or boys, as well as some non-binary persons), and for the gender category "Women+" (includes women and/or girls, as well as some non-binary persons). Prior to 2021, the demographic estimates are based on the concept of sex at birth. Although gender and sex at birth are two different concepts, this change does not cause a significant break in the trend because the two concepts produce very similar distributions.

#### Natural Increase (Natural Decrease, Natural Change)

Natural change is defined to be the number of births minus the number of deaths. In Manitoba, this usually results in a positive number, or natural increase. A negative number would be referred to as a natural decrease.

#### **Intraprovincial Migration**

Intraprovincial migration measures the movements of individuals changing their usual place of residence between regions of the province. In migration measures the flow of individuals to a region, while out migration measures the flow from a region. Net Intraprovincial migration is defined to be Intraprovincial in migration minus Intraprovincial out migration. By definition, the net figure for Manitoba is 0.

#### **Interprovincial Migration**

Interprovincial migration measures the movements of individuals changing their usual place of residence between one province or territory and another. In migration measures the flow of individuals to a province/territory, while out migration measures the flow from a province/territory. Net Interprovincial migration is defined to be Interprovincial in migration minus Interprovincial out migration.

#### **International Migration**

In this report, International migration measures the movements of individuals changing their usual place of residence between Canada and a foreign country. A distinction is made between Immigration, Emigration, and Other International migration. For the purposes of this report, Net International migration is defined to be Immigration minus Emigration.

**Immigration** measures the inflow of landed immigrants, i.e. individuals that do not have Canadian citizenship but have been granted the right to permanently live in Canada.

**Emigration** measures the outflow of Canadian citizens or landed immigrants leaving Canada to establish a permanent residence in a foreign country.

#### **Provincial Nominee Program**

The Manitoba Provincial Nominee Program is a free economic immigration program that expedites the processing of skilled workers planning to stay in Manitoba as permanent residents, by selecting nominees based on local labour market needs.

#### **Other International Migration**

Other International Migration groups together some of the more temporary international migration flows and is comprised of the net change in Non-permanent Residents, plus long-term and short-term Returning Emigrants.

**Non-permanent Residents** are mainly students and/or temporary workers, while the remainder are refugee status claimants and non-Canadian born dependents of refugee claimants or permit holders.

Returning Emigrants are people that have previously emigrated and then subsequently returned to Canada.

#### **Net Temporary Emigration & Other International Migration (pre-2016)**

Net Temporary Emigration represents the variation in people living temporarily abroad that have not maintained a usual place of residence in Canada. It is defined as short-term Emigrants minus short-term Returning Emigrants. Prior to July 2016, Other International Migration was calculated as the net change in Non-permanent Residents, plus long-term Returning Emigrants, less Net Temporary Emigrants.

#### **Total Net Migration**

Total Net migration is defined to be the sum of Net Intraprovincial, Net Interprovincial, Net International and Other International migration.

#### Residual

Residual deviation is obtained by distributing the error of closure linearly throughout the intercensal period.

The **error of closure** is defined as the difference between the final postcensal population estimates on Census Day and the most recent Census counts (adjusted for Census net undercoverage and incompletely enumerated reserves and settlements).

A <u>positive error of closure</u> means that the postcensal population estimates have overestimated the population. A negative residual would then be required to correct the overestimation.

#### Comparability over time

Estimates of population and demographic components may not be fully comparable over time due to seasonal effects, changes in methodologies and completeness of source data.

#### Rate Per '000 Population

A **rate per thousand population** is calculated by dividing the number of events for a time period by the population at the mid-point of the period, then multiplying by 1,000. These crude rates allow for quick comparisons among characteristics or jurisdictions.

In this document, the mid-point population for a Census year is the average of the population estimates for July 1 of the first year (start population) and July 1 of the second year (end population).

## **Methodology Adjustments**

### **Regarding COVID-19**

On March 18, 2020 the Government of Canada implemented travel restrictions aimed at reducing the spread of COVID-19. In order to try and account for the restrictions imposed by Canada, and other countries, Statistics Canada adjusted their usual estimation methods for Emigrants (long-term and short-term) and Returning Emigrants (long-term and short-term). Beginning in 2021, as COVID-19 related travel restrictions started to lift, Statistics Canada modified their methodology adjustments to reflect a return towards pre-pandemic migration levels.

From the first quarter 2022 onward, Statistics Canada has returned to their usual estimation methods for Emigrants and Returning Emigrants. However, slight modifications are being made to ensure that pandemic effects are not carried forward into future estimates. No other COVID-19 related adjustments are being made at this time.

### **Birth Registration Delays**

Birth estimation methods have been adjusted for Manitoba (2021, 2022 and 2023 calendar years) and Nova Scotia (August to December 2021) due to data completeness issues.

## **Canada-Ukraine Authorization for Emergency Travel (CUAET)**

Since March 17, 2022, persons with a Canada-Ukraine authorization for emergency travel who are on Canadian soil are included in the Net Non-permanent Resident estimates.



## **Effective with the May 2024 release:**

#### **Census Base**

Postcensal estimates are based on the 2021 Census counts adjusted for census net undercoverage and for incompletely enumerated reserves and settlements.

#### **Emigration and Returning Emigration**

Emigrants and Returning Emigrants include both long-term and short-term migrants from July 2016 onward. Prior to July 2016, only long-term migrants are included.

#### **Net Temporary Emigration**

From July 2016 onward, short-term Emigrants and short-term Returning Emigrants are included with Emigrants and Returning Emigrants respectively, and the Net Temporary Emigrant component is no longer being provided. Prior to July 2016, short-term Emigrants and short-term Returning Emigrants were accounted for as Net Temporary Emigrants, part of the Other International Migration component.

### **Non-permanent Residents**

From July 2021 onward, estimation methods for non-permanent residents have been adjusted to better account for open work permits without a province/territory of intended destination, permit processing delays and dependents of permitholders.
