

Campground Tips

- Prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species. Always “Clean, Drain, Dry, Dispose and Decontaminate IF”. Visit Manitoba.ca/StopAIS.
- Only build fires in a designated firepit or use a camp stove. Before leaving make sure your fire is completely out.
- Please! Do not litter.
- Be sensitive to wildlife. Bears can be dangerous and should not be fed. Food must be stored away from your campsite, preferably in a locked vehicle, to avoid attracting hungry animals. Do not store food in your tent.
- The use of insect repellent will add to your comfort.
- Learn to recognize and avoid poisonous plants such as poison ivy.
- In case of injury or illness contact a Campground Attendant or Park Patrol Officer. They can assist you to reach medical help.
- Canoeists and hikers travelling in backcountry areas should advise a friend of their intended destination and anticipated length of trip.
- Backcountry camping is only allowed at designated campsites.
- It is illegal to use or transport elm firewood.
- Moving firewood can spread harmful invasive species and destroy our forests. Protect Manitoba’s trees. Don’t move firewood.

Tulabi Lake Campground

- Jack pine and spruce trees create a peaceful solitude

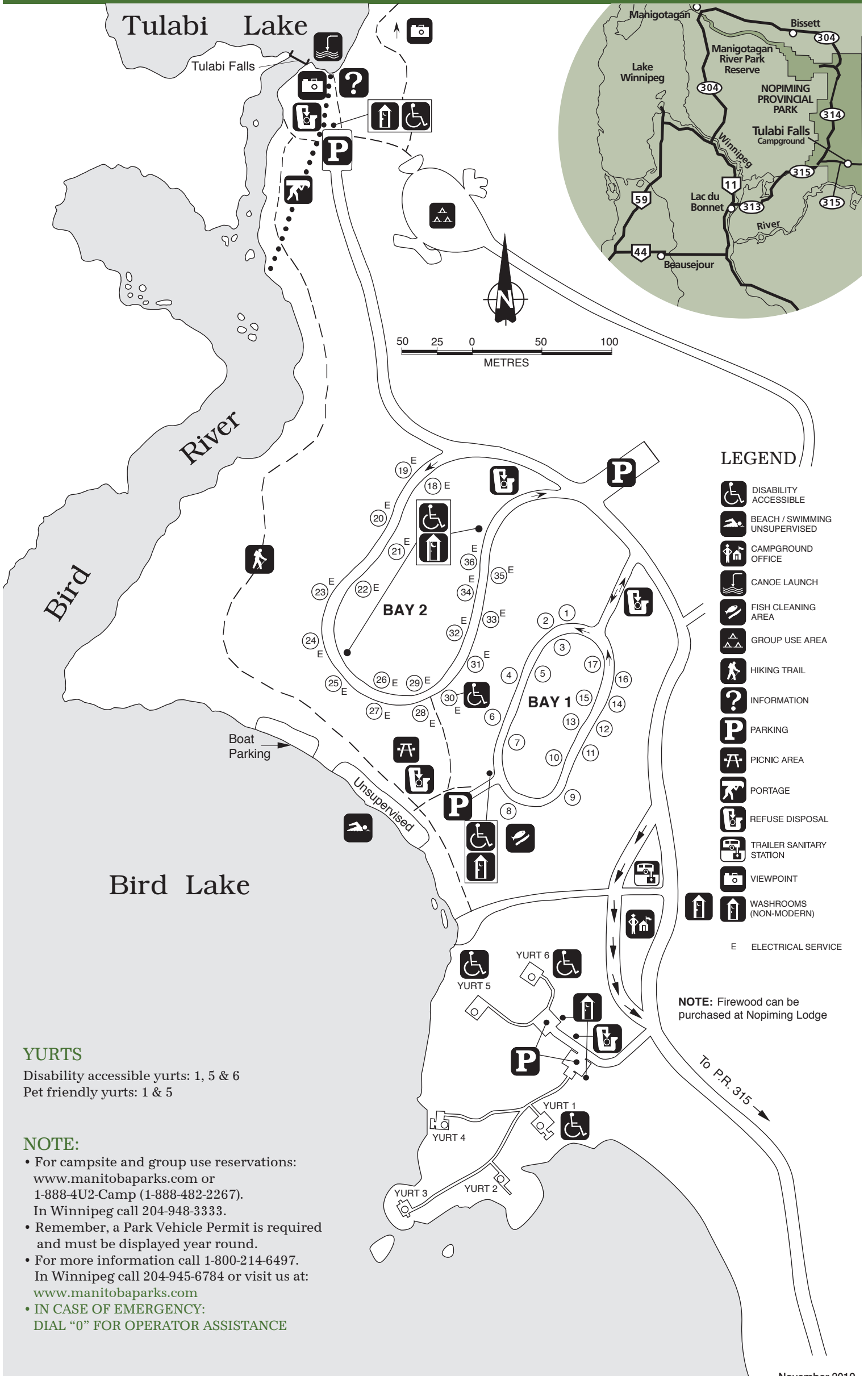


Located in Nopiming Provincial Park - named “Entrance to the Wilderness” by the Anishinabe people; Tulabi Falls Campground offers 17 basic, 19 electrical campsites, and six yurts. Balsam fir, jack pine and spruce trees surround the campground creating a peaceful solitude unique to this location. Campground activities are within the campground area or in close proximity. A lodge and store with gas pumps are also nearby.

The campground is located on Bird Lake beside Tulabi Falls. Enjoy a day at the beach or take a refreshing dip in the clear water of the lake. Enjoy the spectacular view of Tulabi Falls. Bring your canoe for a relaxing paddle on Tulabi Lake or Elbow Lake canoe route. Hike the scenic Tulabi Falls trail and take in the fresh air. Bring your rod and enjoy a quiet day fishing for walleye, northern pike, perch and of course, tulabi. Experience the true wilderness in the rugged yet lush forests of this natural park.
