

St. Malo

Centered on a reservoir, St. Malo Provincial Park has long been a tradition for families and groups seeking a fun and pleasant atmosphere for their gatherings.

Leaves sway and turn with each swell of wind that breaks the silence of a hike through the aspen/oak forest. If you visit the park later in the summer, you'll probably see berry-pickers along the park's roadways harvesting wild plums, chokecherries and saskatoons for campfire pancakes.

The natural features that attract campers for weekend visits are the same ones that helped influence residents to live here. The first settlers of the area arrived in the late 1870s, and since then, generations of families have continued to make this region their home.

Families enjoy swimming, fishing, miniature golf and playgrounds. The absence of powerboats gives calm and quiet waters that might not be found on other, more popular lakes. Relax on the two

beaches. The campground is a great place to stay if you are taking part in one of the summer slow-pitch tournaments.


White-tailed deer, ruffed grouse, wild turkeys, geese and a variety of birds can be viewed within a short driving distance from the park - visit the Wildlife Management Areas of St. Malo, an aspen/ oak forest, and the Rat River managed marsh.

Summer events in and around the park include the St. Malo Triathlon in June and the annual pilgrimage to Our Lady of Lourdes Grotto and shrine in August. St. Pierre-Jolys offers the Frog Follies in mid July and Steinbach hosts Pioneer Days on the August Long Weekend. Finally the town of St. Malo hosts the St. Malo Summer Festival in September and the Festival of Friends in February.
